INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

(1) COMMUNICATION WITH PRISONERS OF WAR INTERNED ABROAD.-

- 1. Subject to the restrictions set forth in the following regulations, Letters, Postcards, Parcels (up to 11 lb.) and Money Orders may be sent free of all postal charges to Prisoners of War (of whatever nationality) interned abroad, and to British (including Canadian) civilians interned in Austria-Hungary, Germany, Turkey and Bulgaria. In the following paragraphs the term "Prisoners of War" includes all interned persons, naval, military or civilian.
- 2. LETTER POST.—Method of Address.—The address of letters whether for Officers, non-commissioned Officers, privates or civilians, must be in the following form, and must be written distinctly in INK. As regards the address of parcels, see paragraphs 8 and 14.

The place of internment if known should always be stated. Correspondence for Prisoners of War employed in working camps in Germany should be addressed to the "parent" camps to which they belong and not to the working camps.

It is necessary in the case of Prisoners of War interned in certain countries to insert the additional addresses shown below:-

Turkey—"Ottoman Red Crescent Society, Constantinople, Turkey."

Norway—"c/o Vaktchefen, Jorstadmoen, Faaberg Jernbanestation Norway."

- 3. Only letters and postcards may be sent by letter post. Letters must be left open. Anything else must be sent by Parcel Post (see below), with the exception of printed matter addressed to British including Canadian subjects interned in neutral countries which should be sent as printed matter see paragraph 27. Communications intended for Prisoners of War must be addressed directly to the persons who are to receive them. Communications apparently intended for a person other than the addressee will not be forwarded. Communication through Prisoners of War with persons residing in territory occupied by the enemy is not permitted.
- 4. Letters to Prisoners of War in Austria-Hungary, Bulgaria, Germany or Turkey should not exceed two sides of a sheet of notepaper and should be clearly written; otherwise they are liable to delay, and may even not be delivered by the authorities in the country to which they are addressed. They must not contain any kind of printed matter, pictorial illustrations or photographs, embellished notepaper or envelopes or any other enclosure except unmounted photographs of persons (see also paragraphs 6, 27B and 30).
- 5. Letters to Prisoners of War in neutral countries also, should be short and clearly written in order to avoid delay and are subject as regards their contents to any regulations which may be from time to time notified in the press. Letters containing newspaper cuttings or unmounted photographs of persons will not however be stopped, but will be liable to considerable delay (see also paragraphs 6, 27B and 30).
- 6. Letters to Prisoners of War in any foreign country must not contain any information which might be of use to the enemy. No reference to naval, military, economic or political situation or to naval or military movements or organizations is allowed. Letters containing such references will not be delivered. Illustrations of war ships, camps, docks, or conspicuous landmarks or bird's-eye views must not be sent. Any enclosure whatever in a letter may entail delay.
- 7. All letters must contain the name of the sender and his own address if this can be properly given. If, however, the writer being a member of the Overseas forces cannot give his address without specifying the unit to which he belongs, he must if he has a relative or friend to whose care a reply can be sent give the address of such relative or friend, and arrange for letters so addressed to be forwarded to him. If he can give no such address he may request the addressee to reply to him c/o Secretary, Central Prisoners of War Committee, 4 Thurloe Place, London, S.W. 7, who, if the writer's address is notified to him, will undertake to forward the

PARCELS for British (including Canadian) and Allied Military or Naval Prisoners (other than Officers) and Parcels for Merchant Seamen and Civilians.-

8. Method of address.

- (a) All parcels must be fully addressed to the place of destination c/o an appropriate Association (see below) unless they are so addressed they cannot be accepted.
- (b) Parcels for a Canadian Prisoner of War belonging to the Canadian Contingent must be addressed c/o the Prisoners of War Department, Canadian Red Cross Society, London, England, in the following form:-

No. 12345 Private A. G. Robinson,

48th Highlanders, Canadian Contingent, B.E.F., Canadian Prisoner of War, Gottingen, Germany. c/o Prisoners of War Department,

Canadian Red Cross Society, London, England.

(c) Parcels for Canadian Civilian Prisoners of War, Prisoners of War belonging to the Imperial Forces, or for Allied Prisoners of War must be addressed c/o the Central Prisoners of War Committee, 4 Thurloe Place, London, S.W., England, in the following form:—

E. J. Smith,

Canadian Civilian Prisoner of War, Ruhleben, Germany. c/o Central Prisoners of War Committee, 4 Thurloe Place, London, England.

PACKING.—Parcels should be packed in the same manner as parcels for delivery in the United Kingdom, Despatch notes and Customs Declarations are not required except in the case of certain parcels for Prisoners of War interned in Switzerland (see paragraph 12 (c). The parcels will be repacked before being despatched from the United Kingdom.



10. Prohibited Articles. - See paragraph 25.

11. (a) Persons desiring to have food or articles of clothing sent to a Canadian Prisoner of War belonging to the Canadian Contingent should send money for the purpose to the Prisoners of War Department, Canadian Red Cross Society, London, England. Articles other than food or clothing for such prisoners may also be purchased through the Prisoners of War Department, Canadian Red Cross Society, or may be sent to that Society to be forwarded if not prohibited. A letter (closed) containing a remittance and asking the Prisoners of War Department, Canadian Red Cross Society, London, England, to send food or other articles to such a Prisoner of War should be addressed to the Prisoner of War, c/o the Prisoners of War Department, Canadian Red Cross Society, London England, in the form indicated in paragraph 8 (b), and if so addressed may be sent free of charge in respect of postage or (where necessary) of registration.

The remittance should be in the form of a Post Office M may Order drawn in favour of the Prisoners of War Department, Canadian Red Cross Society, London, England, for the Prisoner

ot War in question.

The letter will be opened by the Prisoners of War Department, Canadian Red Cross Society, and the parcel will be sent in accordance with the request contained in the letter. The name of any a lopter at whose expense a parcel is sent will be communicated to the Prisoner of War

- (b) The same procedure is to be followed in the case of persons desiring to have food or articles of clothing sent to Canadian Civilian Prisoners of War, Prisoners belonging to the Imperial Forces or to Allied Prisoners of War, with the exception that the Central Prisoners of War Committee, 4 Thurles Place, London S.W., is to be substituted for the Canadian Red Cross Society.
- (c) Letters addressed to the Canadian Red Cross Society, London, England, or to the Central Prisoners of War Committee, London, England, as distinct from those addressed to Prisoners, c/o the Prisoners of War Department, Canadian Red Cross Society, London, England, or Prisoners c/o the Central Prisoners of War Committee, London, England, must be prepaid.
- 12. Parcels for Prisoners of War interned in Switzerland are subject to the following special regulations:—
- (a) Parcels for Prisoners of War and interned needy civilians are exempted from postal and Customs charges only if they do not exceed 1 lb. in weight or if, while exceeding 1 lb. but not exceeding 11 lb., they contain nothing but articles for the personal use of the addressee, such as articles necessary for the care of the body, etc.
- (b) Parcels addressed to interned civilians who are capable of supporting themselves are not entitled to exemption from postage and Customs duty.
- (c) Parcels which under paragraph 12 (a) and (b) are not entitled to exemption from postage will be accepted for transmission by post only on payment of the ordinary postage and under the ordinary regulations governing the transmission of parcels to Switzerland; and for these parcels the senders must prepare Customs Declarations and Despatch Notes.
- (d) Except as modified by the regulations contained in paragraphs 12 (a), (b) and (c) the general regulations govering the despatch of parcels to Prisoners of War in neutral countries apply to parcels for Prisoners of War in Switzerland.

Parcels for British including Canadian and Allied OFFICERS Naval and Military including Officers of the Mercantile Marine.—

- 13. The term "officers" includes officers of the British Merchant Service, viz., maters, mates (including Chief Officers), engineer officers, pursers, doctors, wireless operators and apprentices, also skippers and second hands of tishing vessels.
- 14. Method of Address.—Parcels must be addressed in the manner stated in paragraph 2 as applicable to letters. Parcels will not be accepted for transmission unless the address includes the name of the place of Internment. The address must be clearly written in ink in at least two places on the outer cover of each parcel.
- 15. Packing.—Parcels for Officer Prisoners of War must be very strongly packed. Ordinary thin cardboard boxes such as shoe-boxes, and thin wooden boxes should not be used; nor does a single sheet of ordinary brown paper afford sufficient protection. Parcels which are found to be inadequately protected will not be forwarded. Even where proper materials are used, it is important that the contents should be tightly packed so as not to shake about during transit. All parcels should be packed in such a way as not to impede examination by the censors.

Parcels for Prisoners of War in Bulgaria and Turkey must be packed in tin or hemp-canvas; no other kind of textile material may be used. Parcels packed merely in paper, or in cardboard

or wooden boxes cannot be accepted.

The following forms of packing are recommended for use in other cases :-

(1) Strong double cardboard or strawboard boxes. Those made of corrugated cardboard and having lids which completely enclose the sides of the box are most suitable.

- (2) Strong wooden boxes.
- (3) Several folds of stout packing paper.

Parcels for Prisoners of War in Germany or Austria-Hungary must not be packed in any kind of textile material.

- Prohibited Articles.—See paragraph 25.
- 17. Customs Declarations, which must be prepared in ink in duplicate, are required only for parcels addressed to Holland, and for certain parcels addressed to Switzerland (see paragraph 12 (c).).

Despatch Notes are required only for parcels sent to Turkey and Bulgaria, and for certain purcels addressed to Switzerland (see paragraph 12 (c).).

- 18. Foodstuffs, medical comforts and drugs and wine may be despatched to Officer Prisoners of War in enemy countries only under the special authority of the Prisoners of War Department, Canadian Red Cross Society, London, England, to whom application should be made. No parcels mailed by private individuals containing foodstuffs addressed to Officer Prisoners of War in enemy countries are to be accepted unless the parcel bears a coupon issued by the Prisoners of War Department, Canadian Red Cross Society, London, England.
 - Perishable Foodstuffs may not be sent to neutral countries.
- 20. The regulations contained in paragraph 12 apply also to parcels for Officers interned in Switzerland. Parcels containing clothing and addressed to officers interned in Switzerland are transmitted free of postage and customs duty.
- 21. Parcel Post-General-The following regulations (21-26 inclusive) are applicable to all parcels for Prisoners of War whether Officers, naval and military prisoners other than Officers, or civilians.
- 22. The name of the sender must be clearly shown on the covers of all Parcels for Prisoners A list of the contents must be given on the cover of the parcel.
- 23. The address of the sender also must be clearly shown except when he is a member of His Majesty's Forces, and cannot give his address without specifying the unit to which he In such a case the procedure laid down in paragraph 7 should be followed. belongs.
- 24. No Customs Duty is payable except on certain parcels for Prisoners of War in Switzerland (see paragraph 12). Information as to any special restrictions that may be imposed from time to time at particular camps and also as to articles of clothing which may be sent can be obtained from the Prisoners of War Department, Canadian Red Cross Society, London, England, as regards a Canadian Prisoner of War belonging to the Canadian Contingent or from the Central Prisoners of War Committee, 4 Thurloe Place, London, S.W., in regard to other Prisoners (see paragraph 33).
 - 25. Prohibited Articles.—The following articles must not be included in a parcel:—
 - A. Either to an enemy or a neutral coutry.
 - (1) Written communications (letters must be sent separately by letter post).
 - (2) Printed matter, except authorized printed forms of acknowledgment (see paragraph 27).
 - (3) Pictorial illustrations and photographs.
 - (4) Money.
- (5) Stationery, stamps, playing cards, and similar articles affording facilities for secret communications (except when sent directly from the Prisoners of War Department, Canadian Red Cross Society, London, England).
 - (6) Spirits or solidified 5, its for cooking stoves, matches or inflammable material.
 - (7) Tins or other receptacles which cannot conveniently be opened for inspection.
 - (8) Clothing and footwear (to prisoners other than officers).
- (9) Foodstuffs and wine (except to officers in enemy countries with the special authority of the Prisoners of War Department, Canadian Red Cross Society, London, England (see paragragh 18) and officers in neutral countries.)
 - B. To Enemy Countries.
- (1) Textiles, wool, cotton, leather, or rubber. (Articles of clothing may, however, be sent to Officer Prisoners of War).
- (2) Tennis balls, footballs, golf balls, boxing gloves and gramophone records except in limited quantities and under certain conditions. Full particulars will be forwarded on application to



the Secretary, Central Prisoners of War Committee, 4 Thurloe Place, London, S.W., 7, through whom all parcels containing such articles should be forwarded.

- (3) Photographic apparatus, field glasses, sextants, compasses and other instruments of use for military and naval purposes.
 - (4) Medical comforts and drugs (see paragraph 18).
 - (5) Blankets.
- 26. Any parcel found to contravene these rules will be returned to the sender or sent to the Dead Letter Office for disposal if the name and address of the sender are not known.

27. Printed Matter from the United Kingdom.

- A. Under the British Defence of the Realm Regulations printed matter (i.e., newspapers, books, magazines, etc.) may not be sent to Prisoners of War in neutral or enemy countries except by the holders of special permits (in most cases publishers and news agents in the United Kingdom) to whom therefore orders for the despatch of papers, books or magazines should be given by members of the public desiring to have such articles forwarded. Addresses of the firms in the United Kingdom holding permits for this purpose may be obtained from the Deputy Postmaster General, Ottawa. These regulations will not however be enforced at present in regard to printed matter addressed to British (including Canadian) civilians interned in neutral countries providing that they are mailed as printed matter. Holders of permits can only accept orders for despatch, they can in no case accept actual copies of newspapers, etc., handed in for forwarding.
- B. Educational books i.e., books desired by Prisoners for study purposes (not fiction or current war literature) may also be sent from the United Kingdom to British (including Canadian) Prisoners of War through the medium of the British Prisoners of War Book Scheme (educational). Information respecting that scheme (a registered war charity) may be obtained on application to A. T. Davies, Esq., C.B., Board of Education, Whitehall, London, S.W. 1. The envelope should have the words "Prisoners of War" written in the left hand top corner.
- 28. Printed matter from Canada.—No Newpapers, books, magazines or printed matter of any kind are to be sent from Canada to Prisoners of War interned in enemy countries. Printed matter may be sent to British (including Canadian) subjects interned in neutral countries: see paragraph 27 (a).
- 29. Registration. Letters addressed to Prisoners of War in enemy countries or Switzerland may not be registered. No charge is made for registration of Prisoner of War correspondence to other countries but the fact of registration does not necessarily give any claim to compensation for loss or damage.

30. Remittance of money.

- (a) Remittances may be sent direct to Prisoners of War and should be made by means of Post Office Money Orders which are issued free of commission. Instructions as to how to proceed have already been furnished to Postmasters of Accounting Offices. The transmission of coin either in letters or in parcels is prohibited.
- (b) Postal notes, Bank notes and cheques may not be sent to Prisoners of War in enemy countries.
- (c) Bank notes and cheques may be sent to prisoners of War in neutral countries except to Prisoners of War (other than Officers) in Switzerland.
- 31. No guarantee of the delivery of either letters or parcels can be given. Considerable delay may take place and failure to receive an acknowledgment need not be taken to mean that letters and parcels sent have not been delivered.
- 32. Prisoners of War are allowed to write letters or postcards from time to time but they may not always have facilities for doing so; and the fact that no communication is received from them need not give rise to anxiety.
- 33. Canadian Red Cross Society and Central Prisoners of War Committee. Persons seeking information and advice with regard to Canadian Prisoners of War belonging to the Canadian Gontingent are invited to apply to the Prisoners of War Department, Canadian Red Cross Society, London, England: Information in regard to other Prisoners of War may be obtained on application from the Central Prisoners of War Committee, 4 Thurloe Place, London, S.W.
- 34. The foregoing regulations governing communication with Prisoners of War interned abroad contain various changes and supersede previous regulations on and from the 1st January, 1918.

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

(1) November War Loan.—Postmasters are particularly requested to give the greatest possible prominence to all notices, posters, prospectuses, etc., in connection with the November War Loan, which may reach them. Posters should be conspicuously displayed. and every caller at the Post Office should be invited to take a copy of the prospectus.

(2) Rubber Stamp not to be used on Letters.—Postmasters are especially warned against the use of a rubber stamp for date-stamping letters. All letters must be stamped with the regular steel dating stamp, except in cases in which the contents of a letter would be injured by the use of the steel stamp. The rubber stamp is supplied only for cancelling postage on parcels and letters, the contents of which would be injured by the use of the steel stamp.

(3) Encouraging Use of High Denomination Stamps.—As a measure of economy, postmasters and post office employees are directed to encourage the public to use stamps of the highest denomination suitable to the amount of postage required on all mail matter. For example:—a 2-cent stamp, instead of two 1-cent stamps should be affixed to letters needing two cents postage; and a 10-cent stamp, instead of five 2-cent stamps should be affixed to parcels requiring ten cents postage.

Co-operation between post office employees and the public in the sale and use of stamps of the higher denominations will effect a large saving to the Government in the cost of producing, transporting and cancelling postage stamps, and will benefit the public by minimizing the number of stamps handled and affixed to mail. This benefit will be especially important to business concerns making large quantities of tetters and parcels, and postmasters are directed to

bring this suggestion particularly to their notice.

(4) Restrictions as to sending Sugar to United Kingdom.—Postmasters are instructed, until further notified, to refuse to accept for transmission parcels of sugar addressed to private persons in the United Kingdom, unless a license for the importation of the said parcels into the United Kingdom has been issued by the British Government.

- (5) United States.—Higher Postage Rates on Letters and Post Cards—The Post Office Department of the United States has given notice that the domestic postage rate on letters has been raised from two to three cents per ounce or fraction thereof, and that the domestic postage rate on post cards, other than those mailable at printed matter rates, has been raised from one cent to two cents per card. These new rates came into effect on the 2nd November, 1917, and are applicable to letters and post cards mailed in the United States and addressed for delivery in Canada.
- (6) Virgin Islands of the United States.—The islands formerly known as "Danish West Indies" (St. Thomas, St. John and St. Croix) are now United States Territory, and are called Virgin I-lands of the United States. Mail matter posted in Canada addressed to these islands is subject to the same rates and conditions as when addressed to the United States.
- (7) Error in October Supplement.—Attention is drawn to the fact that in the list given in Section 7, on page 5 of the October Supplement, the following Post Offices are indicated as being situated in Yukon Territory, instead of in the Province of British Columbia:—

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

(1) Parcels for Canadian Expeditionary Forces Overseas.—Parcels addressed to members of the Canadian Expeditionary Forces Overseas should bear the name and address of a second addressee to whom the parcel may be delivered or forwarded if it should prove impossible to deliver to the first. The original address should be written on the front of the parcel where the postage stamps and Customs declaration are affixed, and the second or alternative address should be written on the back of the parcel.

If a second address is not furnished at the time of posting, and delivery cannot be effected, the contents of the parcel, unless of exceptional value or of a personal nature, will be turned over

to the Wilitary Authorities for distribution.

Parcels containing articles of a personal nature or of special value will be returned, if a request for their return in case of non-delivery is made by the sender, such request to be written on the cover of the parcel at the time of posting,

This plan is being adopted at the suggestion of the British Post Office, which states that the present procedure of holding undeliverable parcels at the Dead Letter Office until instructions are received as to their disposal is resulting in the waste of a large quantity of perishable foodstuffs, which form the contents of 90 per cent of parcels addressed to soldiers.

(2) School or College Examination Papers and Educational Exercises as Third Class Matter may bear written comments, etc.—With reference to the regulation published in the April, 1917, Supplement to the Postal Guide (page 5, Sec. 3.) to the effect that school or college examination papers and educational exercises passing between colleges and extra-mural students posted at the third class matter rate may have comments, corrections or instructions written or typewritten upon them, on condition that such comments or notes shall be on the exercises or examination papers themselves, and shall refer solely to the subject matter of the exercises or to the questions put and the answers thereto, and that there shall be nothing that might in any way be described as correspondence, postmasters are advised that the conditions of this regulation have been so far changed as to permit of the comments, corrections or instructions above referred to being written or typewritten on separate sheets of paper, in cases where want of space prevents their being written or typewritten on the exercises or examination papers themselves, provided such separate sheets are attached to the exercises or examination papers and contain nothing that can in any way be described as correspondence.

- (3) Wholly Unpaid Correspondence for Delivery in Canada.—It is stated that many postmasters do not appear to know how they should treat wholly unpaid correspondence posted at their offices for delivery within Canada, and special attention is therefore drawn to the instructions in Section 11 on page 11 of the Official Postal Guide.
- (4) Re-direction of Catalogues Mailed at Parcel Post Rates.—Special attention is drawn to the fact that when catalogues issued by mail order firms have been mailed at parcel post rates and are re-directed from one post office to another for any reason, they must be taxed with additional postage at the rate that would have been chargeable if they had been originally mailed to the new address from the office re-directing them.
- (5) Returned Catalogues.—When catalogues of mail order firms cannot be delivered, and bear a request for return to the senders in case of non-delivery, postmasters should comply with the request, and should tax the returned catalogues with the amount of postage that would be required if such catalogues were mailed at the returning office addressed to the senders.
- (6) Winter Parcel Post Rates to and from Yukon.—Upon the closing of navigation on the Yukon river on or about the 5th of October, the inland parcel post rate to and from all post offices in Yukon Territory, except White Horse, Robinson Station and Carcross, will be 12 cents per pound. All other postage rates to and from Yukon Territory are the same in winter as in summer.
- (7) Offices served by Stage Routes over 100 miles in length.—The postage to be charged on parcels addressed to or mailed at offices on stage routes over 100 miles in length is 12 cents per pound—the maximum charge on a parcel not to exceed 1 cent an ounce. (1) Mail Posted in Canada to Members of the United States Expeditionary Forces in France—Mail for the United States Expeditionary Forces in France is mailable in Canada subject to the same postal rates and conditions as if addressed for delivery in the United States.

No money or valuables can be sent by registered mail.

Packages subject to classification as merchandise cannot be registered.

All mail matter should bear the complete designation of the division, regiment, company and organization to which the addressee belongs, as well as the name and address of the sender, and be fully prepaid by postage stamps affixed.

Senders should be instructed to in no circumstances attempt to designate in the address the location of the unit.

- (2.) Samples of Intoxicating Liquors, &c.—Under Section 110, on page 27, of the Postal Guide, the transmission by post of parcels containing intoxicating liquors or explosives is expressly prohibited, and postmasters are informed that the transmission of samples of these goods is likewise prohibited.
- (3.) Franking and Free Mail Matter.—The Assistant King's Printer and Controller of Stationery, and the Chief Clerk of Distribution have been added to the list of divisions or branches of the Department of Public Printing and Stationery, to which correspondence on public business may be forwarded free of postage under Section 146, on page 37, of the Postal Guide.
- (4) Post Offices on Long Stage Routes—The Post Offices of Beaver Landing and Cumberland House in the Province of Saskatchewan are to be added to the list of Post Offices on stage routes over one hundred miles in length, to and from which the inland parcel post rate is 12 cents per pound; and the following Post Offices are to be removed from that list:—

Chimney Creek, B.C. -Clinton, B.C. -Dragon Lake, B.C. -Kleskun Hill, Alberta. -Sexsmith, Alberta.

- (5) Saccharin Prohibited in Mails for United Kingdom.—The importation of saccharin into the United Kingdom either by parcel post or ordinary mail is prohibited, and postal packages containing saccharin, contrary to this prohibition, are seized by the British Customs Authorities.
- (6) Russia, Prohibition.—The Postal Administration of Russia has given notice that the importation of postage stamps, either cancelled or uncancelled, into that country is prohibited.

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

- (1) Extension of Franking Privilege—The privilege of free transmission by post is extended to correspondence on public business addressed to or sent by the Food Controller of Canada at Ottawa.
- (2) War Tax on Postal Notes.—A considerable number of Postal Notes are being issued without payment of the war tax, and Postmasters are reminded that a war tax of one cent per note must be paid on each and every Postal Note issued; and that the war tax must be paid by means of one cent Postage Stamps attached to the face of the Postal Notes and cancelled with the date-stamp of the issuing Postmasters. The war tax stamps should be affixed to the upper central portion of the Notes in such manner as to cover portions of the words "Not Negotiable" and "Canadian Postal Note" (The numbers printed on the Notes should not be covered).
- (3) Parcel Post to Denmark.—The Parcel Post service by sea direct from England shown on page 114 of the Official Postal Guide has been suspended. Parcels for Denmark may, however, be accepted, until further notice, for transmission by way of England and Norway at the following rates of postage:

- (4) Parcel Post to Sweden.—The only route by which parcel post parcels can now be forwarded to Sweden is by way of England and Norway and parcels therefore must be prepaid at the postage rates shown on page 169 of the Official Postal Guide as applicable to parcels forwarded via Norway.
- (5) Lottery Circulars.—Circulars of the Danish Colonial Lottery are again passing in Canadian Mails. These circulars are signed "R. T. Schroder, Studiestraede 10, Copenhagen, Denmark". This name should be added to the list of Agents of the Lottery given in paragraph 4 on page 5 of the monthly Supplement issued in May 1917.

Letters are not to be forwarded to the address of R. T. Schroder, Studiestraede 10, Copenhagen, Denmark, and Money Orders are not to be made payable to him.

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

- (1) Correspondence for Expeditionary Forces.—Letters, postal parcels and other mail matter for members of the Canadian Expeditionary Force should be addressed as follows :-
 - (a) Regimental number.
 - (b) Rank.
 - (c) Name.
 - (d) Squadron, Battery or Company.
 - (e) Battalion, Regiment (or other unit), Staff appointment or Department.
 (f) Canadian Contingent.

 - (g) British Expeditionary Force.(h) Army Post Office, London, England.

Unnecessary mention of higher formations, such as Brigades or Divisions, is strictly forbidden and causes delay.

Rates of Postage.-Letters.-2 cents for each ounce or fraction thereof with one cent

additional as war tax on each letter.

The sender's name and address should be shown on letters in order that they may be returned if undeliverable.

Post Cards. - 2 cents each.

Newspapers. -1 cent for each 2 ounces or fraction thereof, unless the addressee is known to be in the United Kingdom, in which case Canadian newspapers may be sent at the Canadian inland newspaper rates.

Parcels.—While parcels for the troops must, in all cases, be addressed in care of the Army Post Office, London, England, this in no way affects the rates of postage, which depend entirely upon the location of the person for whom the parcel is intended.

Parcels for troops known to be in the United Kingdom are subject to the parcel post rate for the United Kingdom, which is 12 cents per pound or fraction thereof. The limit of weight

for the United Kingdom, is 11 pounds.

Parcels for the Expeditionary Forces in France and Flanders are subject to the following rates :-..... 24 cents.

The limit of weight in this case is 7 pounds. Parcels for the Egyptian and Salonika Expeditionary Forces are subject to the following rates:-

1 lb.....32 cts. 3 lbs.....48 cts. 5 lbs.....82 cts. 7 lbs.....98 cts. 2 lbs....40 cts. 4 lbs 74 cts. 6 lbs 90 cts.

The limit of weight in this case is 7 pounds.

It is absolutely necessary that all parcels for the troops should be very carefully and securely packed, as, owing to the conditions of transit, parcels not packed with more than ordinary care run great risk of damage or loss of contents.

Thin cardboard boxes such as shoe boxes, and thin wooden boxes should not be used, nor does a single sheet of ordinary brown paper afford sufficient protection. It is also found that

cylindrical tin boxes are very liable to damage. The following forms of packing are recommended:

(1) Strong double cardboard boxes, preferably those made of corrugated cardboard having lids which completely enclose the sides of the boxes.

(2) Strong wooden boxes.(3) Several folds of stout packing paper.

Additional security is afforded by an outer covering of linen, calico or canvas securely sewn It is recommended that all parcels be strongly and securely packed in covers of this nature. The address of the parcel should be written in bold letters on the covering in ink or indelible pencil preferably in two places.

The name and address of the sender should also be clearly written in ink on the cover of the

parcel. Parcels which do not comply with this condition will be refused.

X The contents of the parcel should be stated in writing on the cover.

In the case of parcels for the Egyptian and Salonika Expeditionary Forces, not only must every parcel have an outer covering of strong linen, calico, canvas or other textile securely sewn up, but these parcels should be as nearly round as possible, and well padded with shavings. crumpled paper, or other protective material, particularly if wooden or metal boxes with square corners are used, as such boxes are liable to damage other parcels.

No perishable articles may be sent, and anything likely to become soft or sticky, such as chocolates, etc., must be packed in tins well fastened down.

Cigarettes and tobacco should be packed in tin boxes soldered to make them airtight, and these should then be placed in wooden boxes, otherwise they are liable to be spoiled by dampness.

The address must be written in bold letters on the covering in ink or indelible pencil and

not on a label whether tied or pasted on.

The name and address of the sender must also be written clearly on the covering of the par-Parcels which do not comply with this condition will be refused.

Correspondence for Expeditionary Forces in East Africa.

Address.-Letters and other postal packets intended for members of the Canadian Expeditionary Forces with the British Expeditionary Forces operating in East Africa should be addressed as follows :-

- (a) Regimental number.(b) Rank.(c) Name.

- (d) Squadron, Battery or Company.

(e) Battalion, Regiment (or other unit), Staff Appointment or Department.

(f) Canadian Contingent.
(g) British East African Expeditionary Force. (h) Army Post Office, London, England.

The name and address of the sender should be written on the cover of all letters and other articles.

The Rates of Postage are as follows:-

Letters—2 cts. per oz. (and war tax 1 cent each). Post Cards—2 cents each. Newspapers-1 cent per 2 oz.

Parcels.—1 lb. 32 cts.; 2 lbs. 40 cts.; 3 lbs. 48 cts.; 4 lbs. 80 cts.; 5 lbs. 88 cts.; 6 lbs. 96 cts.; 7 lbs. \$1.04; 8 lbs. \$1.36; 9 lbs. \$1.44; 10 lbs. \$1.52; 11 lbs. \$1.60.

- (2) Date-Stamping of letters.—It is observed that postmasters are too generally neglecting to date-stamp incoming letters and letters re-directed in accordance with changes of address. Incoming letters must be date-stamped on receipt, and letters re-directed in accordance with changes of address must invariably be date-stamped on the date of despatch, and postmasters whose offices are not City offices are cautioned to observe greater care in this important duty. Outgoing letters should be date-stamped on the face; incoming letters on the back.
- (3) Parcels containing paint, maple syrup, etc.—A number of cases have occured recently where packages containing paint, maple syrup and other liquids sent by mail have been broken open during course of post, causing damage to other articles of mail matter with which they came into contact, and postmasters are requested to caution the public as to the absolute necessity, when posting articles of this nature, to comply strictly with the terms of the regulations governing the acceptance of such matter for transmission by post-see Section 124 of page 30, Canada Official Postal Guide, 1917. The attention of postmasters is particularly directed to this regulation, and they are instructed to see that no article of this character, which is not sufficiently protected, from possible shock and pressure of the mails, is accepted for transmission.
- (4) War tax on letters and parcels from Montserrat.—A war tax of 1d. (one cent) has been imposed on every letter and parcel addressed from Montserrat to Canada and other parts of the British Empire.
- (5) War tax on letters from Northern Rhodesia.—A war tax of 1d. (two cents) has been imposed on every letter addressed from Northern Rhodesia to Canada and other parts of the British Empire.
- (6) War tax on letters from Southern Rhodesia. A war tax of 1d. (two cents) has been imposed on every letter addressed from Southern Rhodesia to Canada and other parts of the British Empire.
- (7) Post offices have catch-post service only.—The following post offices are to be added to the list of post offices having catch-post service only :--

Ardrossan, Alberta. Deville, Alberta. Bremner, North Cooking Lake, ** Clover Bar. Jaffray, B.C.

- (8) Fraud order.—A fraud order has been issued against R. Gennert, Stamp Dealer, 91 Calle de Padua, Barcelona, Spain,
- (9) Parcel Post with St. Pierre and Miquelon, direct exchange established.—An arrangement, which takes effect forthwith, has been made for the direct exchange of parcels between Canada and the Islands of St. Pierre and Miquelon. Under this arrangement parcels will no longer be sent via England, and the rate of postage on parcels mailed in Canada will be 12 cents for each pound or fraction of a pound. The limit of weight for a single parcel will be 11 pounds.

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

(1) Mails for Units of Canadian Expeditionary Forces.—When making up face-slipped packages for Units of the Canadian Expeditionary Forces, postmasters are requested to write out in full the name of the Battalion, Battery or other Unit for which the package is intended, as any abbreviations are likely to prove responsible for missorting. For instance, a package intended for the 73rd Battery might be sent by mistake to the 73rd Battalion if the facing-slip were written "73 Batt."

An effort should be made to write legibly and make plain figures.

Postmasters should also see that the packages are securely tied up, so that there may be no danger of a package breaking in transit.

- (2) War Savings Certificates.—Postmasters are reminded of the necessity and desirability of keeping before the public, in every manner possible, the advantage of purchasing War Savings Certificates, both as a patriotic service and a safe and profitable investment.
- (3) Notices to be sent to Publishers when Newspapers and Periodicals cannot be delivered to Subscribers. The special attention of all postmasters is drawn to the regulation in Section 58 on page 19 of the Official Postal Guide, regarding the notifications which they should send to publishers in cases where newspapers or periodicals sent from the office of publication have remained uncalled for during four weeks, or have been refused.

Attention is also drawn to Section 59, regarding newspapers and periodicals which continue to be sent after the publishers have been twice notified that they have been unclaimed or

refused.

Neglect on the part of any postmaster to notify publishers, as required by Section 58, or to return unclaimed newspapers, if the publishers continue to send them after having been properly notified, will be seriously regarded by the Department.

- (4) Date-Stamping of wrapper enclosing unclaimed Newspapers or Periodicals.-Postmasters are cautioned to see that the Special Wrapper, Form No. 29, B., which they use when returning unclaimed newspapers and periodicals to publishers, as required by Section 59 on page 19 of the Postal Guide, are very carefully date-stamped.
- (5) Red Cross Surcharge on Straits Settlements Postage Stamps.—It is the intention of the Postal Administration of Straits Settlements to surcharge the 3-cent, 4-cent and 8-cent Straits Settlements postage stamps "Red Cross 2 cents", and these surcharged stamps are to be recognized as valid for pre-payment of postage for an amount not including the surcharge.
- (6) Parcel Post to Russia Suspended.—Postmasters must not accept any parcels for transmission to Russia in Europe or Russia in Asia, until further notified. The route via Vancouver and Japan to Validivostok, which has for some time been the only one open, has been closed for the present.

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

(1) Parcels for Prisoners of War.—Postmasters are urgently requested to give most particular attention to parcels mailed at their offices for Prisoners of War, and to do all in their power to assist the public in seeing that such parcels do not exceed the prescribed limit of weight (eleven pounds), and are otherwise in conformity with the regulations published in the Monthly Supplement for February, 1917.

Parcels which are even very slightly over eleven pounds in weight cannot go forward from Canada, and if an over-weight parcel is accepted and sent on from the office where it is posted, the Canadian Exchange Office making up the parcel mail is obliged to send it to the Dead Letter

Office for return to the sender. The despatch of the parcel is thus seriously delayed, causing disappointment and possible suffering to the prisoner for whom it is intended, all of which would be avoided by a little care on the part of the postmaster at the mailing office, who should immediately hand any over-weight parcel back to the sender to have part of its contents removed

- (2) War Tax on Letters from Trinidad.—A war tax of one penny has been imposed by the Government of Trinidad on all letters posted in that Colony to other parts of the British Empire, dating from the 2nd April, 1917. It is requested that any insufficiently prepaid correspondence received in Canada from Trinidad may be duly taxed.
- (3) Franking Privilege.—The Imperial Munitions Board has been inadvertently omitted from the list of Public Departments at Ottawa to and from which correspondence on official business may be forwarded free of postage, given on pages 38 and 39 of the Official Postal Guide. Postmasters are requested to amend their copies of the Guide accordingly.
- (4) Lottery Circulars.—Attention is again drawn to the fact that circulars of the Danish Colonial Lottery are passing in the Canadian mails. These circulars are usually posted in Copenhagen, Denmark, prepaid with a 20 öre postage stamp. The following is a list of the names and addresses of Agents of the Lottery:—

(2) Notice to Publishers regarding Unclaimed Newspapers.—Complaints have reached the Department that postmasters in notifying publishers of newspapers and periodicals in regard to copies of their publications which are unclaimed, by means of forms 67 B. (English) and 67½, B. (French), neglect to date-stamp the forms, with the result that the publishers cannot tell from what office the notice comes and are unable to correct their mailing

The attention of postmasters is therefore drawn to the necessity for date stamping these forms very distinctly, and for writing the name of the person to whom the unclaimed paper was addressed very legibly, so that there may be no further occasion for complaint.

(3) School or College Examination Papers and Educational Exercises passing as Third Class Matter may bear written comments, &c.—On and after the 1st May, 1917, school or college examination papers and educational exercises passing between colleges and extra-mural students posted at the third class matter rate may have comments, corrections or instructions written or type-written upon them, on condition that such comments or notes shall be on the exercises or examination papers themselves, and shall refer solely to the subject matter of the exercises or to the questions put and the answers thereto,

and that there shall be nothing that might in any way be described as correspondence.

Postmasters are requested to amend that part of Section 76 on page 22 of the Postal Guide relating to "school or college examination papers" and "educational exercises" in accordance

with the above.

- (5) Franking and Free Mail Matter.—This Department is informed that No. 16 in the list of Divisions or Branches of the Department of the Interior on page 38 of the Postal Guide should read "Controller of Timber and Grazing Lands," instead of "Controller of Timber and Irrigation." Postmasters are requested to correct their copies of the Guide accordingly.
- (6) United States A. R. or Return Receipt Forms.—It has been brought to the attention of this Department that many Canadian Postmasters are not sending the A. R. forms-"return receipts"—relating to registered articles posted in the United States to the nearest Canadian Exchange Office which makes up British mails, as they are instructed in Section 167 on page 42, and Section 96 on page 69 of the Postal Guide, but are sending these "return receipts" back to the United States direct, enclosed in the official envelopes intended for the despatch of Money Order advices to United States post offices.

It is requested that all postmasters will see that the instructions in this matter are most

strictly observed by their offices in future.

- (7) War Taxes.—This Department is advised that a war tax of one penny has been imposed on every letter and three pence on every parcel post parcel addressed from Turks and Caicos Islands to all parts of the British Empire (except on parcels for members of His Majesty's Army or Navy); also that a war tax of one half-penny has been imposed on every letter addressed from the Cayman Islands to all parts of the Britsh Empire.
- (8) Postal Notes. -Postal notes which do not contain the names of the purchasers are frequently received by newspaper offices and other business establishments unaccompanied by any documents to indicate the names of the senders. The trouble and inconvenience caused in this way would be avoided if postmasters would invariably instruct the purchasers of postal notes to write their names on the notes in the space reserved for that purpose. The purchasers

should, of course, also be instructed to fill in the names of the payees and offices of payment. Unless postal notes are properly filled in the purchasers run a risk of losing the amounts.

(9) Bag Labels must be Removed.—As soon as bags of mail received at any Post Office have been emptied, the bag labels should be very carefully removed, before the bags are used again or are sent to the depository.

The duty of removing the bag labels has been neglected by some postmasters, with the result that serious mis-sendings of mail matter have occurred.

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

 SPECIAL NOTICE.—The 1917 issue of the Official Postal Guide has been published and is now being distributed.

Should any postmaster discover an error in the description of his office as set forth therein, he is requested to notify the Department at once.

2. CHANGES TO BE MADE IN 1917 EDITION OF THE OFFICIAL POSTAL GUIDE.

The following entries in the Table containing information as to postage, etc., on mail matter despatched to other countries, which begins on page 76 of Part I of the Guide, should have been omitted, and postmasters are requested to obliterate them:—

Austria-Hungary, page 78. Bulgaria, page 80. Hungary, page 84.

On page 3 of Part II of the Guide, the reference following the statement "The offices marked, etc.," should read "See Section 128, page 31".

3. No stamps other than Postage Stamps to be sold in Post Office— The attention of the Department has been called to the fact that some postmasters have been selling the war tax stamps issued by the Department of Inland Revenue to be used in paying the war tax on all proprietary or patent medicines, perfumery or cheques, and that the public have, through purchasing these stamps from post office officials, been led to believe that they could be used for the payment of postal charges, and, having used them for this purpose, have been seriously inconvenienced.

The sale by postmasters of these stamps issued by the Inland Revenue Department must cease forthwith, and postmasters are hereby informed that, unless specially actified, they must not keep for sale, either through their own offices or stamp vendors, any stamps but postage

stamps.

- 4. Mails for Units of Canadian Expeditionary Forces.—When making up mails or face-slipped packages for Units of the Canadian Overseas forces postmasters are instructed to see that the Unit address when written is made very plain and written with heavy black or indelible pencil. In the case of facing-slips, the Unit address should appear about the centre of the slip and not at the extreme top, as in such cases, when the facing slip becomes frayed or torn, the address is destroyed. Cases have occurred where errors in sortation of letter packages have been caused by the illegibility of the Unit address on the respective facing-slips.
- 5. Extension of Franking Privilege.—The Honorary Advisory Council for Scientific and Industrial Research, Ottawa, is a branch of the Department of Trade and Commerce, and the privilege of free transmission by post is extended to official correspondence sent by or addressed to the Chairman or Secretary of the Council, Department of Trade and Commerce.
- 6. Caution Against Bogus Subscription Agents.—Some time ago a man pretending to represent the Canadian Subscription Company was operating in the West and obtaining subscriptions for well-known magazines. Many complaints reached the Post Office Department, but before action could be taken by the police the man had escaped. There were several agents connected with this subscription fraud, but the most active and the one the police were after was known as R. H. Reede.

There is evidence that this kind of fraud is being revived, and postmasters are instructed to endeavour to put the public on their guard against persons offering subscriptions to well-

established magazines at prices far below the regular rates.

7. Extension of International Reply Coupon Service.—The Colony of Jamaica participates in the International Reply Coupon Service, dating from the 1st of February, 1917.

The Office of Jamaica is prepared to exchange reply coupons which are not date-stamped by the issuing office and will accept as valid coupons which its own offices may have omitted to date-stamp at the time of issue. It agrees that the declarations of the Exchange Office and of the International Office shall be considered as evidence in the case of loss of coupons established by the office of origin and does not see any objection to the exchange of :-

- (a) Coupons marked with a special perforation, provided it does not prevent the reading of the inscription and verification of the value;
- (b) Coupons on which the country of origin shall have considered it necessary to alter in handwriting or otherwise the selling price, after previously notifying the Administrations interested through the International office.

Finally, the Jamaica Office is prepared to exchange reply coupons which have been numbered by the country of origin, but does not intend to number those it issues.

Any Postmaster who does not receive a copy of the Monthly Supplement each month is requested to notify the Controller of Postal Stores, Ottawa.

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

I.—COMMUNICATION WITH PRISONERS OF WAR INTERNED ABROAD.

The following regulations became effective on the 1st February, 1917:-

1. LETTERS, POSTCARDS, PARCELS (up to 11 lb. but not to contain foodstuffs or articles of clothing as set forth in the following regulations), AND MONEY ORDERS may be sent FREE of ALL POSTAL CHARGES to Prisoners of War (of whatever nationality) interned abroad and to British Civilians interned in Austria-Hungary, Germany, Turkey and Bulgaria. In the following paragraphs the term "Prisoners of War" includes all interned persons, military or civilian.

2. LETTER POST:-

(a) Method of address—The address of letters whether for Officers, non-commissioned officers, privates or civilians, must be in the following form and must be written distinctly in INK. As regards the address of parcels, see paragraph 3 (a).

The place of internment, if known, should always be stated. Correspondence for Prisoners of War employed in working camps in Germany should be addressed preferably to the "parent" camps to which they belong, and not to the working camps.

It is necessary in the case of Prisoners of War interned in certain countries to insert the additional addresses shown below:—

Turkey—"Ottoman Red Crescent Society Constantinople, Turkey."
Norway—"c/o Vaktchefen, Jorstadmoen, Faaberg, Jernbanestation, Norway."

- (b) Only letters and postcards may be sent by Letter Post. Letters must be left open. Anything else must be sent by Parcel Post (see below). Communications intended for Prisoners of War must be addressed direct to the persons who are to receive them. Communications apparently intended for a person other than the addressee will not be forwarded. Communication through Prisoners of War with persons residing in territory occupied by the enemy is not permitted.
- (c) Letters to Prisoners of War in Austria-Hungary, Bulgaria, Germany or Turkey should not exceed two sides of a sheet of note paper and should be clearly written; otherwise they are liable to delay, and may even not be delivered by the authorities in the country to which they are addressed. They must not contain any kind of printed matter, pictorial illustrations or photographs, except unmounted photographs of persons (see also paragraphs 2 (e) and 8).
- (d) Letters to Prisoners of War in neutral countries should also be short and clearly written in order to avoid delay. Letters containing newspaper cuttings or unmounted photographs of persons will not, however, be stopped, but will be liable to considerable delay (see also paragraphs 2 (e) and 8).
- (e) Letters to Prisoners of War in any foreign country must not contain any information which might be of use to the enemy. No reference to the naval, military or political situation or to naval or military movements or organizations, is allowed. Letters containing such references will not be delivered. Illustrations of warships, camps, docks, or conspicuous landmarks or bird's-eye views must not be sent. Any enclosures whatever in a letter may entail delay.
 - (f) All letters must contain the name and address of the sender.
- 3. PARCELS for British (including Canadian) and Allied Military or Naval Prisoners (other than Officers), or Civilians.
- (a) Method of Address.—Parcels for a Canadian Prisoner of War belonging to the Canadian Contingent must be addressed in care of the Prisoners of War Department, Canadian Red Cross Society, London, England. Unless they are so addressed, they cannot be accepted. The address should be in the following form:—

No. 12345, Private A. G. Robinson, 48th Highlanders, Canadian Contingent, B.E.F. Canadian Prisoner of War, Gottingen, Germany, ... c/o Prisoners of War Department, Canadian Red Cross Society, London, England.

Parcels for Canadian Prisoners of War belonging to the Imperial Forces, for Canadian civilian Prisoners of War, and for Allied Prisoners of War, must be fully addressed to the place of destination, care of Central Prisoners of War Committee, 4 Thurloe Place, London, S.W.

- (b) **Packing.**—Parcels should be packed in the same manner as parcels for delivery in the United Kingdom. Despatch Notes and Customs' Declarations are not required. The parcels will be repacked before being despatched from the United Kingdom.
- (c) **Prohibitions.**—The following articles, in addition to those mentioned in paragraph 5 (d), must not be included:—
 - (i) Tins or other receptacles which cannot conveniently be opened for inspection.

(ii) Foodstuffs of all kinds.

- (iii) (To enemy countries only).—Regulation uniforms, and all articles of clothing, and boots for naval and military prisoners other than officers.
- (d) Persons desiring to have food or articles of clothing sent to a Canadian Prisoner of War belonging to the Canadian Contingent should send money for the purpose to Prisoners of War Department, Canadian Red Cross Society. Articles other than food or clothing for such prisoners may also be purchased through the Prisoners of War Department, Canadian Red Cross Society, London, England, or may be sent to the Prisoners of War Department, Canadian Red Cross Society, London, England, to be forwarded if not prohibited. A letter (closed) containing a remittance and asking the Prisoners of War Department, Canadian Red

Cross Society, London, England, to send food or other articles to such a Prisoner of War should be addressed to the Prisoner of War, care of the Prisoners of War Department, Canadian Red Cross Society, London, England, in the form indicated in paragraph 3 (a), and if so addressed, may be sent free of charge in respect of postage or (where necessary) of registration.

The remittance should be in the form of a Post Office Money Order drawn in favour of the

Prisoners of War Department, Canadian Red Cross Society, London, England, for the Prisoner

of War in question.

The letter will be opened by the Prisoners of War Department, Canadian Red Cross Society London, England, and the parcel will be sent in accordance with the request contained in the letter. The name of any adopter or relative at whose expense a parcel is sent will be communicated to the Prisoner of War.

(Letters addressed to the Canadian Red Cross Society, London, England, as distinct from those addressed to Prisoners, care of the Prisoners of War Department, Canadian Red

Cross Society, London, England, must be prepaid.)
In the case of Canadian Prisoners of War belonging to the Imperial Forces or of Canadian civilian Prisoners of War or of Allied Prisoners of War, the terms of this regulation apply, and the same procedure should be followed, with the exception that in all such cases letters should be addressed care of, and Money Orders drawn in favour of the Central Prisoners of War Committee, 4 Thurloe Place, London, S.W., England, who are acting for this class of prisoners.

4. PARCELS for Officers:-

- (a) Method of address. Parcels should be addressed in the manner stated in paragraph 2 (a) as applicable to letters. Parcels will not be accepted for transmission unless the address includes the name of the place of internment. The address must be clearly written in ink in at least two places on the outer cover of each parcel.
- (b) Packing.—Parcels for Officer Prisoners of War must be very strongly packed. Ordinary thin cardboard boxes such as shoe-boxes, and thin wooden boxes should not be used; nor does a single sheet of ordinary brown paper afford sufficient protection. Parcels which are found to be inadequately protected will not be forwarded. Even where proper materials are used, it is important that the contents should be tightly packed so as not to shake about during transit. All parcels should be packed in such a way as not to impede examination by the censors.
 - (c) The following forms of packing are recommended:—
- Strong double cardboard or strawboard boxes. Those made of corrugated cardboard and having lids which completely enclose the sides of the box are most suitable.

(ii) Strong wooden boxes.(iii) Tin boxes such as are used for packing biscuits.

(iv) Several folds of stout packing paper.

Parcels for Prisoners of War in Bulgaria and Turkey must be packed in wood, tin or hemp canvas; no other kind of textile material may be used. Parcels packed merely in paper or cardboard cannot be accepted.

Parcels for Prisoners of War in Germany or Austria-Hungary must not be packed in any

kind of textile material.

Butter, etc., should be wrapped in several folds of grease-proof paper and enclosed in a tin which should have a tightly fitting lid but not be sealed against inspection; the tin should be enclosed with any other articles for transmission in an outer box.

(d) Customs Declarations, which must be prepared in ink in duplicate, are only required for parcels addressed to Holland.

Despatch Notes are only required for parcels sent to Turkey and Bulgaria.

- (e) In addition to the articles mentioned in paragraph 5 (d), perishable foodstuffs must not be included in a parcel for an officer.
- 5. PARCEL POST-GENERAL.—The following regulations are applicable to all parcels for Prisoners of War, whether officers, naval and military prisoners other than officers, or civilians.
- (a) The name of the sender must be clearly shown on the covers of all parcels for Prisoners of War. A list of the contents must be given on the cover of the parcel.
 - (b) The address of the sender must also be clearly shown.
 - (c) No Customs Duty is payable. Information as to any special restrictions that may be

imposed from time to time at particular camps, may be obtained from the Central Prisoners of War Committee, 4 Thurloe Place, London, S.W., England.

(d) The following articles must not be included in a parcel:—
(i) Written communications (letters must be sent separately by letter post).
(ii) Printed matter.

(iii) Pictorial illustrations and photographs. (iv) Money.

(v) Stationery, stamps, playing cards and similar articles affording facilities for secret communications.

(vi) Textiles, wool, cotton, leather or rubber. (Articles of clothing may, however, be sent

to Officer Prisoners of War.)

(vii) Tennis-balls, footballs, and golf-balls.
(viii) Spirits or solidified spirits for cooking stoves, matches or other inflammable material. (ix) (To enemy countries only.) Photographic apparatus, field glasses, sextants, compasses

and other instruments of use for Military or Naval purposes.

- (e) Any parcel found to contravene these rules will be returned to the sender or sent to the Dead Letter Office for disposal if the name and address of the sender are not known.
- 6. PRINTED MATTER FROM THE UNITED KINGDOM (i.e., newspapers, books, magazines, etc.) may not be sent to Prisoners of War in neutral or enemy countries except by the holders of special permits from the War Office (publishers or news agents in the United Kingdom) to whom therefore orders for the despatch of papers, books, magazines should be given by members of the public desiring to have such articles forwarded. Addresses of firms holding permits for this purpose may be obtained from the Chief Postal Censor, Strand House, Portugal St., London, W.C.

Educational books (not fiction, magazines or current war literature) may also be sent from the United Kingdom to British (including Canadian) Prisoners of War through the medium of the British Prisoners of War Book Concern (Educational). Information respecting that scheme may be obtained on application to A. T. Davies, Esq., Board of Education, Whitehall, London, S.W., England.

- 7. NO PRINTED MATTER TO BE SENT FROM CANADA. No newspapers, books, magazines, or printed matter of any kind, are to be sent from Canada to Prisoners of War interned in neutral or enemy countries.
- 8. REGISTRATION.—Letters addressed to Prisoners of War in Holland only may be registered. No charge is made for registration; but the fact of registration does not necessarily give any claim to compensation for loss.
- 9. REMITTANCE OF MONEY.—(a) Remittance may be sent direct to Prisoners of War and should be made by means of Post Office Money Orders, which are issued free of commission. Instructions as to how to proceed can be obtained from Postmasters of Accounting Offices. The transmission of coin, either in letters or in parcels, is prohibited.

(b) Postal Notes, Bank Notes and Cheques may not be sent to Prisoners of War in enemy

countries.

- (c) Bank Notes and Cheques may be sent to Prisoners of War in neutral countries.
- No guarantee of the delivery of either parcels or letters can be given. Considerable delay may take place, and failure to receive an acknowledgment need not be taken to mean that letters and parcels sent have not been delivered.
- 11. Prisoners of War abroad are allowed to write letters or postcards from time to time; but they may not always have facilities for doing so; and the fact that no communication is received from them need not give rise to anxiety.
- 12. CENTRAL PRISONERS OF WAR COMMITTEE.—Persons seekingi nformation and advice in regard to British (including Canadian) Prisoners of War are invited to apply to the Central Prisoners of War Committee, 4 Thurloe Place, London, S.W., England.
- 13. It is to be noted that the above regulations governing communication with Prisoners of War contain numerous and important changes, superseding previous regulations on and from 1st February, 1917.

II. Tobacco for French Soldiers.—Attention is drawn to Section 13 on page 7 of the August 2, 1915 Supplement regarding the announcement of the French Post Office that parcels containing tobacco, cigars or cigarettes cannot be accepted for delivery to individual French soldiers, but that parcels of tobacco, cigars or cigarettes intended for general distribution among the French troops, or to French military hospitals or ambulances, will be accepted and admitted to France free of customs charges, if addressed to the Ministry of War, Paris, France. These regulations are still in force.

Parcels containing tobacco, cigars or cigarettes may still be sent to individual members of the British and Belgian armies operating in France, and are admitted free of customs charges.

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

(1) Parcels for Canadian Frisoners of War Abroad.—Notification has been received to the effect that all individual parcels for prisoners of war interned abroad are being stopped, and that the Canadian Red Cross Society is sending food in bulk to such prisoners.

Postmasters are accordingly instructed not to accept any parcels addressed to individual

prisoners of war interned abroad.

- (2) Parcels for Canadian Soldiers in United Kingdom must bear Regimental Address to secure delivery duty free.—Duty is frequently charged by the British Authorities on parcels intended for Canadian soldiers, which have been addressed by the senders in Canada to private addresses in the United Kingdom, and postmasters are requested to advise the public that, in order to secure delivery duty-free, gift parcels for Canadian soldiers in the United Kingdom should always bear the soldiers' regimental address, and not a private address.
- (3) Customs Declarations not necessary on Soldiers' Parcels.—As gift parcels from Canada addressed to the regimental addresses of members of the British Expeditionary Forces, and the Canadian and the other Overseas Contingents, are delivered free of Customs duty, it is not necessary that such parcels should be accompanied by Customs Declaration forms, provided that each parcel bears the name and address of the sender and a general statement of the contents.
- (4) Requests not needed for Articles sent to United States Navy.—Postmasters are informed that the regulation in Sec. 2 on page 5 of the Monthly Supplement for May, 1918, requiring that parcels for the United States Expeditionary Forces in Europe should contain the officially approved request of the addressee for the articles enclosed does not apply to parcels addressed to officers and men on board United States naval vessels or attached to Naval Bases, in care of the Postmaster, New York. No requests are needed for the articles enclosed in these parcels.



(5) National War Savings and Thrift Stamps.—By Order-in-Council passed on the 22nd of November, 1918, the franking privilege has been conferred upon Chairmen of the several Provincial War Saving Committees, and also upon the Assistant Receivers General in connection with the mailing and receiving of letters and other mailable matter relating to National War Savings and Thrift Stamps. All such letters must be marked "O.H.M.S."

The Chairmen of Provincial Committees have their headquarters at the following points:-

- (6) Pension Cheques to be mailed without Registration.—Notification has been received from the Board of Pension Commissioners at Ottawa that on and after the 1st January, 1919, the pension cheques issued by the Board will be mailed as ordinary letters without registration.
- (7) Correspondence of Branch Farms and Stations of Experimental Farms. The special attention of postmasters is drawn to the fact that the privilege of free transmission by post, which applies to correspondence sent by and addressed to the Experimental Farms at Ottawa, does not extend to correspondence sent by or addressed to the Branch Farms and Stations of the Experimental Farm which are established by the Dominion Government in places outside of Ottawa. Correspondence for and from these Branch Farms and Experimental Farm Stations should be prepaid at ordinary postage rates.
- (8) Treatment of Catalogues of Mail Order Firms.—It has been represented to the Department that many postmasters in towns and villages, who are merchants, are opposed to the circulation of the catalogues of Mail Order Firms, and therefore do not deliver copies of these catalogues which come by post addressed to people receiving mail through their offices.

The attention of postmasters is accordingly drawn to the fact that the withholding from delivery of any article of mail matter is one of the most serious offences against postal law, and they are warned that if it is found that any posmaster has failed to deliver a catalogue addressed to a person receiving mail at his office, or has neglected to return within a proper time a catalogue addressed to his office which he cannot deliver, and of which the sender has requested the return in case of non-delivery, such failure will be dealt with very seriously by the Department.

- 9. War Tax on Correspondence from Australia.—With reference to section 4 on page 4 of the November Monthly Supplement, it is to be noted that the war tax on correspondence posted in the Commonwealth of Australia is one halfpenny each on all letters (except those for members of the A. I. F. abroad, and the Australian Navy), letter cards, post cards, and newspapers exceeding 2 oz. in weight.
- 10. Parcels for Australia containing Goods for Sale.—The Postmaster General's Department for the Commonwealth of Australia has given notice that in future an extra charge of 6 d. (12 cents) to cover cost of handling, will be collected from the addressee on each parcel containing goods for sale, which is received in the Commonwealth by parcel post from overseas.
- 11. Parcel Post to Mexico.—The parcel post service to Mexico by way of England has been resumed. For rates and conditions, see Official Postal Guide, page 143.

(1) Correspondence for Canadian Expeditionary Forces in Siberia.— Letters, parcels and other mail matter should be fully addressed, giving the following particulars:— (a) Regimental number.

(b) Rank.

(c) Name.

(d) Squadron, Battery or Company. (e) Battalion, Regiment (or other unit).

(f) Canadian Expeditionary Forces, Siberia.

The name and address of the sender should be written on the covers of both letters and parcels.

Rates of Postage-Letters.-Two cents for each ounce or fraction thereof, with one cent additional as war tax on each letter.

Newspapers.—One cent for each 2 ounces or fraction thereof.

Parcels.-Twelve cents for each pound or fraction thereof. Limit of weight for a single

parcel, 7 lbs.

It is necessary that all parcels should be carefully and securely packed, and it is recommended that an outer cover of linen, calico or canvas, should be securely sewn up. The address should be written in bold letters on the cover in ink or indelible pencil and not on a label whether tied or pasted on.

The contents of the parcel should be stated in writing on the cover.

No perishable articles may be sent, and anything liable to become soft or sticky must be packed

in tins well fastened down. Cigarettes and tobacco should be packed in air-tight tin boxes.

If it should prove impossible to deliver a parcel to the person to whom it is addressed, and if the sender has not either furnished the name and address of some other member of the C. E. F. in Siberia to whom it may be delivered, or written a request for the return of articles of a personal or exceptionally valuable nature to the sender's address, in case of non-delivery, the contents of the parcel will be turned over to the military authorities for distribution.

Parcels for the C. E. F. in Siberia are not subject to Customs charges, and do not require

Customs declarations.

All correspondence for the C. E. F. in Siberia should be forwarded to Vancouver.

(2) Mail for Fort McFherson and Herschell Island. The Comptroller of the Royal North West Mounted Police has advised this Department that a R. N. W. M. Police Patrol will leave Dawson, Yukon Territory, about Christmas and will be prepared to carry mail for Fort McPherson and Herschell Island. No large parcels can be carried, but endeavour will be made to carry all letters and newspapers of a reasonable weight.

(3) Game, Raw Furs, Plumage, &c., also Living Animals, in Inland Post The following is to be substituted for Section 198 on page 46 of the Official Postal Guide:

The dead bodies of any wild animals or birds or parts thereof, including furs, skins, plumage, eggs, etc., will not be accepted for transmission by mail, even when lawfully killed, unless the packages are plainly marked to show the actual nature of the contents and the name and

address of the sender.

During the close season, which varies in the different Provinces of the Dominion, no packages containing the dead bodies of any wild animals or birds or parts thereof, including furs, skins, plumage, eggs, etc., will be accepted for mailing, unless the sender produces a permit from the Game Warden covering the shipment; and all such packages must bear a full and accurate description of the contents, and the name and address of the sender.

The transmission by mail of living animals of any kind (except bees and day-old chicks in

properly constructed cases) is prohibited.

- (4.) War Tax on Correspondence from Australia.—The Department has been advised that a war tax of half-penny each has been imposed on each article posted in the Commonwealth of Australia, except parcels. It is requested that insufficiently prepaid correspondence received in Canada from the Commonwealth may be duly rated, and the necessary charge collected on delivery.
- (5.) War Taxes on Letters and Parcels from Falkland Islands.—The Government of the Falkland Islands has imposed additional postage charges of one penny (2 cents) for the first ounce and one half-penny (1 cent) for each succeeding ounce in the case ofletters, and of one shilling (24 cents) on each parcel posted in the Falkland Island adressed to other parts of the Empire.

It is requested that any deficiency in the postage prepaid on correspondence from the Falk-

land Islands received in Canada may be collected from the addressees.

- (6) Roumania-Suspension of Postal Services.-All postal services to Roumania are suspended.
- (7) Post Office served by Catch Post only, to and from which fragile parcels cannot be sent.-Niton, West Edmonton, Alberta.

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

(1) Military Service Forms.—Postmasters in Ontario are requested to return without delay to the office of the Ontario Registrar under the Military Service Act at Toronto all unused Military Service Forms which may be in their possession. It was requested that all these unused forms should be returned upon completion of the registration on 3th November, 1917, but apparently many Postmasters neglected to return them.

(2) Winter Mail Service to Mackenzie River.—Mail service has been arranged

for the winter of 1918-19 as follows:-

(1) Mails will leave Edmonton on the 25th November, 23rd December, 27th January, 24th February and 24th March for Fort McMurray, Fort McKay, Fort Chipewyan, Fort Fitzgerald, Fort Smith and Fort Resolution.

(2) Mails will leave Edmonton on the 25th November, 23rd December and 27th January

for Hay River, Fort Providence and Fort Simpson.

(3) Mails will leave Edmonton on the 25th November for Fort Wrigley, Fort Norman, Fort Good Hope, Arctic Red River and Fort McPherson.

It is necessary to limit the mail matter for these despatches to registered and ordinary letters, post cards, newspapers and parcels of reasonable weight, preference being given in every case to registered matter according to the date of posting.

- (3) Personal Parcel Scheme for Prisoners of War other than Officers.—With reference to information given in paragraph 3 on page 6 of the February Monthly Supplement regarding articles which may be included in the personal parcels for prisoners of war other than officers, advice has now been received that a pair of socks may be substituted for a pair of mittens or a muffler.
- (4) Prohibited Exports from Canada.—The exportation from Canada of Canadian silver coin, silver bullion and fine silver bars is prohibited, except under license issued by the Minister of Finance, the Deputy Minister of Finance or the Acting Minister or Acting Deputy Minister.
- (5) War Tax on Letters and Postal Packets from Jamaica.—The war tax of ½d. each on letters, and 3d. each on postal packets addressed from Jamaica to other parts of the British Empire is to be continued till 31st March, 1919. It is requested that any deficiency in prepayment of the required taxes on mail matter from Jamaica may be collected from the addressees.
- (6) War Tax on Letters and Parcels from the Somaliland Protectorate.

 —Dating from 1st September, 1918, the Government of the Somaliland Protectorate has imposed a tax of one anna (2 cents) on all letters and a tax of four annas (8 cents) on all parcels posted within the Protectorate to other parts of the British Empüre. It is requested that any deficiency in prepayment of these taxes on letters and parcels may be collected from the addressees.
- (7) Increased Letter Postage from Sierra Leone.—The postage rate on letters from Sierra Leone to all parts of the British Empire has been increased from 1d. to 1½d. per ounce dating from 1st September. It is requested that any deficiency in the postage prepaid on letters from Sierra Leone may be collected from the addressees.
- (8) Parcel Post Service Suspended.—The Parcel Post service to Mexico has been suspended.
- (9) Winter Parcel Post Rates to and from Yukon.—Upon the closing of navigation on the Yukon river, early in October the inland parcel post rate to and from all post offices in Yukon Territory, except White Horse, Robinson Station and Carcross, will be 12 cents per pound. All other postage rates to and from Yukon Territory are the same in summer as in winter.
- (10) Franking Privilege to Officers of Canada Food Board.—With reference to Departmental Circular of 17th October, 1917, giving the names and addresses of officers exercising food control in Canada to whose official correspondence posted at and addressed to their headquarters franking privileges have been extended, postmasters are informed that Mr. Philip Furois has been appointed Secretary of the Provincial Committee, Quebec, of the Canada Food Board, and that his frank will be recognized on official matter relating to the Canada Food Board mailed at Quebec. Letters addressed to Mr. Furois in his official capacity as Provincial Secretary at Quebec of the Canada Food Board will also be entitled to free transmission.

Postmasters are also informed that Mr. L. E. Mutton of Regina, Sask., has been appointed to succeed Mr. G. A. Mantle as Provincial Secretary of the Saskatchewan Committee of the Canada Food Board, and that the franking privileges are transferred to official correspondence posted by, and addressed to Mr. Mutton at Regina.

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

(1) Franking and Free Mail Matter—The following additions, &c., are to be made to the List of Public Departments at Ottawa and Divisions or Branches thereof to and from which correspondence on public business may be forwarded free of postage:—

Under the Privy Council add (2) Bureau of Public Information.

After "Fuel Controller" add Canada Registration Board, War Trade Board and Depart-

ment of Soldiers' Civil Re-Establishment.

The name of the Military Hospitals Commission has been changed to Invalided Soldiers Commission.

- (2) Postmasters not to furnish Information—Postmasters are not permitted to furnish information regarding the financial standing or reputation of patrons of their offices. This regulation is to be added to those in section 230 on page 51 of the Official Postal Guide.
- (3) Correspondence for Deceased Persons—With reference to section 242 on page 52 of the Official Postal Guide, postmasters are informed that correspondence from the Pension Board addressed to deceased pensioners of the Canadian Army, and correspondence from the Assigned Pay and Separation Allowance Branch of the Department of Militia and Defence, Ottawa, addressed to deceased persons should be returned direct to the senders.

(4) Post Office served by Catch Post only, to and from which fragile parcels may not be sent—Kilemley, Dist., Cariboo, B.C.

The Post Office of Ribstone, Alberta, is removed from the list of offices having catch post service only, as trains now stop at Ribstone.

(5) Canadian Postal Notes for British and Canadian Armies in France-The Postal authorities of the United Kingdom have arranged for the payment of Canadian Postal Notes by the British Field Post Offices in France. Postal Notes may therefore be remitted to members of the Canadian and British armies in France.

The Postal Notes should be filled in as follows:-On the line marked "Postmaster at....." should be written "British Field Post

Office, France.

On the line marked "Pay to....." should be written—The payee's military number (or rank, if an officer),—his name—his battalion or regiment.

The purchaser's name should be written in the space provided for the purpose. No Postage Stamps should be attached to the Postal Notes, except the War Tax Stamps. It is of the utmost importance that the Postal Notes be properly filled in so as to ensure

their being paid to the proper payees.

In the case of lost Postal Notes remitted to France the amounts will be refunded to the remitters by means of duplicate notes. Refunds cannot be made, however, until after the expiration of at least eight months from the dates on which the missing notes were purchased

- (1) Treatment of Military Service Acknowledgment of Receipt Cards.—Notwithstanding the instructions given on page 6 of the May Supplement the Ontario Registrar under the Military Service Act informs the Department that postmasters are not dealing properly with the Acknowledgment of Receipt Cards (M.S.A. Form 22) which accompany letters sent out by Military Service Act Registrars. Special attention is therefore drawn to the fact that when a letter accompanied by an Acknowledgment of Receipt form M.S.A. 22, is received at any Post Office, the postmaster should enter on the form the date on which he delivers the letter to the person it is a dressed to, and should have that person sign the form. The postmaster should then return the form without any delay to the M.S.A. Registrar.
- (2) Letters for Enemy Occupied Territory except Belgium and France.—With reference to notices in the Monthly Supplements for February and March, 1918, and to Departmental Circulars, on the subject of letters for enemy countries and territory occupied by the enemy, postmasters are informed that in tuture letters for enemy occupied territory, other than that in Belgium and France, may be addressed direct in the ordinary way. Such letters will be subject to censorship.

Correspondence intended for destinations in enemy countries or in those portions of enemy occupied Belgium and enemy occupied France to which letters may be forwarded may still be sent through the intermediary of Thos. Cook & Son. 530 St. Catherine Street West, Montreal. Any persons who wish to forward correspondence in accordance with this arrangement should be requested to apply to Messrs. Thos. Cook & Son for full information.

- (3) War tax on Letters from Gibraltar.—A war tax of one halfpenny has been imposed on each letter posted in Gibraltar to places within the British Empire, and it is requested that any deficiency in prepayment on letters arriving from Gibraltar for delivery in Canada may be collected from the addressees.
- (4) Parcels for Prisoners of War in United Kingdom.—No parcels containing foodstuffs may be sent from Canada to prisoners of war interned in the United Kingdom. Any such purcels received in the Canadian Postal Service are to be returned to the senders as non-e transmissible.
- (5) Parcels for Prisoners of War in Turkey.—With reference to notice on pag 4 of the July Supplement, postmasters are informed that the parcel post service to prisoners of war in Turkey has been resumed.
- (6) Parcel Post Service Suspended.—The Department is informed that Parcel Post Service to the Dominican Republic is suspended.
- (7) Post Office Served by Catching Post.—Freshfield, Alberta, is to be added to the list of post offices having Catch Post Service only, (shown by the mark ‡ in the List of Post Offices, Part II of the Postal Guide) to and from which fragile parcels cannot be sent.

- (2) War Tax on Letters from Gold Coast.—The Government of the Gold Coast Colony has imposed a war tax of one penny on each letter posted in that Colony addressed to places within the British Empire. This tax came into effect on the 17th June, and it is requested that the deficiency may be collected from the addressees in case any letters coming to Canada from Gold Coast are not fully prepaid.
- (3) Post Office having Catch Post Services only.—The Post Office of Fairfield East, County Leeds, Ontario, is to be added to the list of Offices served by Catch Post only (indicated in the Alphabetical List of Post Offices in Part II of the Postal Guide by the sign ‡ placed in front of the name) to and from which fragile parcels must not be sent.
- (4) Fraud Orders.—A fraud order having been issued against a person advertising under the name of Professor Abdallah, Box 1206, Moose Jaw, Sask., postmasters are informed that letters are not to be forwarded to that address, and that Money Orders and Postal Notes are not to be made payable thereto.

Increased Postage on Letters from United Kingdom.—The letter postage from the United Kingdom to Canada and other parts of the British Empire has been raised to one and one-half penny for the first ounce and one penny each additional ounce. Surcharges should be collected according to British Post Office markings on any insufficiently prepaid letters received in Canada.

The postage on letters addressed to soldiers and sailors serving in all Naval and Military Forces of the Crown remains one penny per ounce.

7 Tax on Letters Posted in Newfoundland for Canada.—The General Post Office, Newfoundland, has advised this Department that a tax of one cent each has been levied on all letters addressed to Canada, the United States, United Kingdom, etc., in addition to the regular postage rate.

Any letters received in Canada from Newfoundland on which the tax has not been prepaid

should be duly rated.

- 8. Taxes on Letters and Parcels posted in Bahamas for Canada.—This Department is advised that the Government of the Bahamas has imposed additional charges of one penny each on all letters, and one shilling each on all parcels posted in that Colony to other parts of the British Empire. Any letter or parcel coming to Canada on which these additional charges have not been prepaid should be duly rated.
- 9. Articles Prohibited from Importation into Japan by Mail.—The following is to be added to the Lists of Articles prohibited from transmission to Japan by mail on pages 85 and 133 of the Official Postal Guide:—Foreign Rice except such as may be imported by the Minister of Agriculture and Commerce or persons designated by him. This prohibition is not applicable to rice imported into Taiwan (Formosa) and into Karafuto (Japanese Saghalien).

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

(1) Goods Prohibited Exportation From Canada—Amendments to Departmental Circular of 27th February, 1918.—Referring to the instructions given in Departmental Circular of the 27th February, 1918, for the treatment of goods prohibited exportation from Canada, Postmasters are instructed to make the following changes in the paragraph quoted below:

Paragraph: "The following exception to the regulation contained in the preceding paragraph has been made in favour of articles destined to any British country or to the United States:

Mailings containing a number of different articles each of small value, or mailings not exceeding \$100. in value, EXCEPT SUGAR (not maple sugar), farm or garden seeds, or bran, shorts, or middlings from grain.

Such mailings may be accepted without license for transmission to any British country, or to the United States."

Changes: After the words "or mailings not exceeding "insert "\$50" instead of "\$100." After the words "EXCEPT SUGAR (not maple sugar)" insert "flour".

Goods Prohibited to all Destinations.—The following goods have been prohibited exportation to all destinations, except under license, and are to be added to the list of goods marked "E" in Customs Memorandum No. 2172-B:

Abrasives and all materials entering into their manufacture.

Ammonium Sulphate.

Bones and other materials entering into the manufacture of fertilizers.

Calcium Carbide.

Caustic Soda or

Sodium Hydroxide. Chemical Wood Pulp.

Electrodes.

Iron or Steel comprising wire rods, wire plain or galvanized, or otherwise coated. sheets, plates, bars. Linen Yarn. Linen Thread.

Machinery.

Machine planers of metal. Mechanical Wood Pulp.

Newsprint Paper.

Platinum.

Postmasters must, under no circumstances whatever, accept any packages containing such goods for transmission to any country until the senders have furnished the required license. Applications for licenses permitting exportation should be made by the senders direct to the War Trade Board, Ottawa.

Export Licenses for Soldiers' Parcels Unnecessary. - No exportation licenses are now required for parcels containing foodstuffs, comforts, etc., addressed to soldiers of the Canadian Expeditionary Forces, and also to soldiers of the British, French and other Allied Forces, as well as those addressed to military hospitals of the Allies.

(2). Parcels posted to United States expeditionary forces must contain officially approved request of addressee.—Postmasters are hereby informed that parcels for members and individuals connected with the United States Expeditionary Forces in Europe must not be despatched unless they contain such articles only as are being sent at the written request of the addressee approved by his regimental or higher commander or an executive officer of the organization with which he is connected.

Postmasters must secure the assurance of the sender, in each case, that all the articles contained in the parcel are sent at the addressee's approved written request, and that such request is enclosed in the parcel by requiring the sender to place on the wrapper of the parcel under his name and address, the following endorsement :-

"This parcel contains only articles sent at approved request of addressee which is enclosed.

The approved written request must be enclosed in the parcel.

Parcels whether Sealed or Unsealed containing articles not being sent in accordance with approved written request must not be accepted for mailing. Such articles when offered for mailing must be returned to the sender.

These instructions are issued on account of an order from the United States War Department.

The Canadian Post Office Department is informed that this action is prompted by military necessity, and Postmasters are hereby instructed to rigidly enforce the instructions given above.

(3). Franking Privilege Extended to Department of Soldiers Civil Re-Establishment.—The Department of Soldiers Civil Re-establishment has been constituted a regular Government Departments at Ottawa, and, as such, is entitled under Section 134, page 36, Canada Official Postal Guide, 1918, to send and receive mail free of Canada postage.

Postmasters are, therefore, instructed to add the name of this Department to the list of Public Department given in Section 146, page 38 of the Postal Guide 1918, correspondence addressed to which on public business may be forwarded free of postage.

(4). Suspended Parcel Post Services. -Parcel Post is suspended to the following destinations; Cuba, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Holland, Greece, Northern Persia, Mohammerah (Persia), Italy (Provinces of Udine, Vicenza, Treviso, Padua, Venice and Belluno), Portugese West Africa, Cape Verde Islands and Madeira.

(5) Disposition of Undeliverable Copies of the Canadian Food Bulletin.—The Canada Food Board has been authorized to place the following request on envelopes containing copies of "The Canadian Food Bulletin", which that Board is distributing by Mail:

"Instructions to Postmasters.

If the person to whom this package is addressed cannot be found, please remove the enclosed copy of the Canadian Food Bulletin and distribute it to some one else who will be interested in it. The envelope should be returned without fail to the Canada Food Board, as a check on its mailing list.

By Order of Postmaster General."

Postmasters are hereby instructed to distribute undeliverable copies of "The Canadian Food Bulletin" to persons interested, when the envelopes bear the authorized request which appears above and return the envelopes to the Canada Food Board, Ottawa,

(6) Foreign Lottery Circulars.—Circulars relating to a lottery at Panama are passing through the mails.

Letters are not to be forwarded to Mr. M. F. Serra, P.O. Box 241, Panama, agent for this Lottery. Neither are Money Orders or Postal Notes to be made payable to him.

- (7) Fortune Telling Circulars.—Circulars relating to the Fortune telling business carried on by Madame Starr, 318 Michigan Avenue, Toledo, Ohio, U.S.A., are passing in the mails. Fortune telling is contrary to the Criminal Code, and letters addressed to Madame Starr are to be returned to the senders marked "Prohibited."
- (8) Personal Parcel Scheme for Prisoners of War other than Officers. Referring to Departmental circulars of the 1st and 23rd February, 1918, Postmasters are informed that personal parcels for Prisoners in neutral countries will require a Customs Declaration.
- (9) War Tax on Letters from British Guiana.—A war tax of one penny has been imposed by the Government of British Guiana on all letters addressed from British Guiana to any destination within the British Empire.
- (10) War Tax on Letters from Gilbert and Ellice Islands Colony.—A war tax of one penny has been imposed by the High Commissioner for the Western Pacific on all letters posted in the Gilbert and Ellice Islands Colony with the exception of those on which the minimum charge is two pence half-penny.
- (11) Fraud Order Withdrawn.—The fraud order issued against the Consumers Association of Windsor, Ontario, (N. Martin, Manager) has been withdrawn, and letters may now be forwarded to this concern and Money Orders and Postal Notes may be made payable to it.
- (12) Serial Numbers on Third Class Matter.—Section 82 on page 24 of the Official Postal Guide has been amended by inserting the word "written" after "printed" in the first line. This makes the section read as follows: "Serial numbers printed, written or impressed upon and so inserted in third class matter do not render such matter liable to a higher rate of postage."
- (13) Form M.S.A. 22 to be specially filled in and returned to M.S.A. Registrar.—The Department has been advised by the Military Service Authorities that Postmasters frequently do not insert the date of delivery before obtaining the signature of the addressee to Form M.S.A. 22 (Acknowledgment of Receipt Card) and that many Postmasters are slow in returning the cards to the M.S.A. Registrar.

Postmasters are, therefore, warned that these Acknowledgment of Receipt Cards (M.S.A. 22)

must be specially filled in and promptly returned to the M.S.A. Registrar.

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

1. Changes in List of Superintendents of Railway Mail Service. The following changes should be made in the list of Superintendents of Railway Mail Service on page 7 of the Official Postal Guide: the name of the Superintendent of Railway Mail Service in Quebec District is P. O. Marineau; the name of the Superintendent of Railway Mail Service in Montreal District is R. L. LaPrairie; and "North Bay DistrictJohn Purcell.... North Bay" should be inserted after "London District."

2. Restrictions of British Government on Newspapers and Periodicals. The following regulations in regard to newspapers and periodical publications sent to the United Kingdom and to soldiers overseas supersede those contained in the January 1918 Supplement page 4, paragraph 3, and in departmental circular of the 14th of March. 1918:—

Daily, weekly and other periodical publications may be mailed to addresses in the United Kingdom in bundles containing one or more copies, but not more than ten, prepaid at the

usual rates.

The usual rate on newspapers despatched direct from the publishing offices to bona fide sub-cribers in the United Kingdom is still effective but the same safeguards must be observed as for domestic mails to ensure that the mailings are to bona fide subscribers only.

Newspapers and periodicals may also be sent by parcel post in parcels not exceeding seven pounds in weight prepaid at parcel post rates, but larger consignments must not

be split up into seven pound parcels.

When mailed to soldiers in France, and on other fronts, a number of copies not exceeding ten may be enclosed in one bundle, but the rate in all cases, will be one cent for each two ounces or fraction thereof.

3. Postal Service to Palestine.—A limited postal service to the civilian population of that portion of Palestine occupied by the British Forces is now being provided by the Army Post Office with the Egyptian Expeditionary Force.

Unregistered letters and post cards fully prepaid at the international letter rate of 5 cents for the first ounce and 3 cents for each additional ounce or fraction thereof and 2 cents each for post cards can be forwarded. The correspondence must be of a private or domestic character.

There is no service at present for registered mail, printed matter or parcels addressed to the civilian population of Palestine.

- 4. Suspension of Parcel Post Services.—Parcel Post service is suspended to the following destinations:—Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Holland, Greece, Northern Persia, Mohammerah (Persia) the North-Eastern Districts of Italy, at present occupied by the enemy, and Portuguese West Africa.
- 5. Packing of Butter for Parcel Post.—Much trouble has been caused by the miproper packing of butter for transmission by parcel post to Great Britain and other countries, and postmasters are instructed to be careful not to accept parcels containing butter in future, unless the butter is packed in a tin box or glass container fitted with a lid either soldered on or serewed on, and the tin or glass container enclosed in a case of corrugated cardboard lined with sufficient cotton or spongy material to absorb the butter in case it melts and leaks out.
- 6. Postage required on Parcels.—It is reported to this Department that many parcels, especially parcels addressed to soldiers overseas, reach the Canadian parcel post exchange offices without postage; and the attention of postmasters is therefore drawn to the fact that postage must be prepaid on all parcels for Canada and other countries, except those addressed to prisoners of war.

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

(1) Personal Parcel Scheme for Prisoners of War other than Officers.— With reference to Departmental circular of February 1st, 1918, and to paragraph 3 on page 6 of the February Supplement, in regard to the above scheme, Postmasters are informed that the following additional regulations must be strictly observed:

(1) No newspaper or other printed paper and no written paper must be enclosed in a parcel or used in wrapping or packing a parcel.

(2) The contents of each parcel should be packed in a plain stout cardboard box, which should be wrapped in brown paper and securely tied with strong string.

(3) The address should be plainly written on two sides of the parcel in the following form :-

Kriegsgefangenensendung,

c/o G. P. O. London. Regimental Number, rank, name, initials, Regiment (or other unit) Canadian Prisoner of War, Name of Internment Camp,

Germany.

(4) The name and address of the sender and a list of the contents of the parcel must be written on the outside of the parcel and the coupon must be affixed on the outside also.

The coupons referred to in connection with this scheme are not issued by the Department in Canada, but by the Societies in London, England, mentioned in paragraph 4 of Departmental circular of February 1, 1818. An application must be made to these Societies for the coupons by the next of kin. Great care should be taken of the coupon as it cannot be replaced.

(2) Letters for Enemy Countries.—It has been found that the charge previously stipulated (25c.) for the forwarding of correspondence from Canada to enemy and enemy occupied territory through the medium of Thos. Cook & Son, Montreal, does not cover the costs of such transmission, and in future the charge for forwarding such correspondence will be 35c. per letter.

This amount is to be remitted by means of a Postal Note, together with the letter which is to be forwarded, to Thos. Cook & Son, 530 St. Catherine Street West, Montreal, in accordance with the instructions which may be obtained on application from Thos. Cook & Son.

All enquiries on this subject are to be made to Thos. Cook & Son, 530 St. Catherine Street West, Montreal, who will furnish a copy of the regulations to be observed in sending such correspondence. When writing Thos. Cook & Son a stamped addressed envelope must be enclosed if a reply is desired.

Too much attention cannot be paid to the regulations governing this correspondence, as any

item which contravenes these regulations in any way will not be transmitted.

(3) Restrictions as to sending Sugar to the United Kingdom. Canadian Government prohibits the exportation of sugar from Canada, by post or otherwise, unless authorized by license from The Canada Food Board, and the British Government prohibits its importation into that country without a license from The Royal Commission on Sugar Supplies in the United Kingdom.

By way of exception to these prohibitions, the following concessions have been authorized:—

(a) Sugar sent as gifts to Canadian soldiers in the United Kingdom or France provided the parcel is addressed to the addressee at his regimental address.

(b) Sugar, in quantities not exceeding one pound in weight, mailed to the United King-

dom under any other circumstances.

In all other cases it is necessary for the sender to obtain an export license from the Canada Food Board, Ottawa, and for the addressee to obtain an import license from the Secretary, Royal Commission on the Sugar Supplies, Scotland House, Victoria Embankment, London, S.W., England. Applications for license should be made by letter. Maple sugar does not fall under the sugar prohibitions.

The above notice supersedes the restrictions issued in the November, 1917 Supplement to

the Postal Guide, Section 4, Page 5.

- (4) Parcels for Bermuda, West Indies, etc., not transmitted via United Several cases have been brought to the notice of the Department in which parcel post parcels for Bermuda, the West Indies, British Guiana and other parts of South America have been sent from Canadian post offices to New York in the ordinary mails and have been returned as not transmissible. The special attention of all postmasters is therefore drawn to the fact that no parcel post matter can be forwarded from Canada to another country by way of the United States.
- · (5) Limit of Weight-Parcels for Soldiers in Italy. No parcel addressed to a Soldier in Italy may exceed seven pounds in weight.
- (6) Parcel Post Services Suspended. The Parcel Post Services via England to Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Greece, the Districts of Udine and Trevista in Italy, Persia and Portuguese West Africa are suspended, and postmasters should be careful not to accept parcels addressed to these countries, until further advised.
- (7) Error in Table of Parcel Rates. The correct rate on a 9 pound parcel for Denmark via England and Norway is \$1.32, not \$1.22 as printed on page 116 of the Official Postal Guide. Postmasters are requested to make the necessary correction in their copies of the Guide, as, although this Parcel Post Service is now suspended, it may be resumed later.

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

- (1) Correspondence for Expeditionary Forces.—Letters, postal parcels and other mail matter for members of the Canadian Expeditionary Force should be addressed as follows :-
 - (a) Regimental number.
 - (b) Rank.
 - (c) Name.
 - (d) Squadron, Battery or Company.
 - (e) Battalion, Regiment (or other unit), Staff appointment or Department.
 - (f) Canadian Contingent.
 - (g) British Expeditionary Force (In England, France or Flanders, Italy, Salonika, Egypt, Palestine, Mesopotamia or East Africa, as the case may be).
 - (h) Army Post Office, London, England.

Unnecessary mention of higher formations, such as Brigades or Divisions, is strictly forbidden and causes delay.

Rates of Postage.-Letters.-2 cents for each ounce or fraction thereof with one cent additional as war tax on each letter.

The sender's name and address should be shown on letters in order that they may be returned if undeliverable.

Post Cards. -2 cents each.

Newspapers. -1 cent for each 2 ounces or fraction thereof, unless the addressee is known to be in the United Kingdom, in which case Canadian newspapers may be sent at the Canadian inland newspaper rates.

Parcels.-While parcels for the troops must, in all cases, be addressed in care of the Army Post Office, London, England, this in no way affects the rates of postage, which depend entirely upon the location of the person for whom the parcel is intended.

Parcels for troops known to be in the United Kingdom are subject to the parcel post rate

for the United Kingdom, which is 12 cents per pound or fraction thereof. The limit of weight for the United Kingdom is 11 pounds.

It is absolutely necessary that all parcels for the troops should be very carefully and securely packed, as, owing to the conditions of transit, parcels not packed with more than ordinary care

run great risk of damage or loss of contents.

Thin cardboard boxes such as shoe boxes, and thin wooden boxes should not be used, nor does a single sheet of ordinary brown paper afford sufficient protection. It is also found that

cylindrical tin boxes are very liable to damage.

The following forms of packing are recommended :-

(1) Strong double cardboard boxes, preferably those made of corrugated cardboard having lids which completely enclose the sides of the boxes.

(2) Strong wooden boxes.(3) Several folds of stout packing paper.

Additional security is afforded by an outer covering of linen, calico or canvas securely sewn It is recommended that all parcels be strongly and securely packed in covers of this nature. The address of the parcel should be written in bold letters on the covering in ink or indel-

ible pencil and not on a label whether tied or pasted on.

All parcels addressed to members of the Canadian Expeditionary Forces Overseas should bear the name and address of a second addressee to whom the parcel may be delivered or forwarded if it should prove impossible to deliver to the first. The original address should be written on the front of the parcel where the postage stamps and Customs declaration are affixed, and the second or alternative address should be written on the back of the parcel.

If a second address is not furnished at the time of posting, and delivery cannot be effected, the contents of the parcel, unless of exceptional value or of a personal nature, will be turned over

to the Military Authorities for distribution.

Parcels containing articles of a personal nature or of special value will be returned, if a request for their return in case of non-delivery is made by the sender, such request to be written on the cover of the parcel at the time of posting.

The name and address of the sender must in all cases be clearly written in ink on the cover

of the parcel. Parcels which do not comply with this condition will be refused.

The contents of the parcel should be stated in writing on the cover. In the case of parcels for the Forces in Egypt, Salonika, Palestine, Mesopotamia or East Africa not only must every parcel have an outer covering of strong linen, calico, canvas or other textile securely sewn up, but these parcels should be as nearly round as possible, and well padded with shavings, crumpled paper, or other protective material, particularly if wooden or metal boxes with square corners are used, as such boxes are liable to damage other parcels.

No perishable articles may be sent, and anything likely to become soft or sticky, such as chocolates, etc., must be packed in tins well fastened down. Cigarettes and tobacco should be packed in tin boxes soldered to make them airtight, and these should then be placed in wooden boxes, otherwise they are liable to be spoiled by dampness.

2. Letters for Enemy Countries and Countries Occupied by Enemy. Arrangements have now been made whereby correspondence can be transmitted from Canada to enemy and enemy occupied territory through the medium of Thos. Cook & Son. Montreal. The charge for forwarding letters is twenty-five cents which must be remitted to Thos. Cook & Son, Montreal, by means of a postal note. This charge covers the expense of transmit-

ting the letter to a neutral country, the forwarding from there of the letter to an enemy country and the transmission of the reply from a neutral country to the person in Canada.

Certain restrictions are in force in regard to this correspondence, and full particulars may be obtained by any one wishing to correspond with enemy or enemy occupied territory on applying to Messrs. Thos. Cook & Son, 530 St. Catherine St. W., Montreal, and enclosing a stamped addressed envelope for the reply. In case any inquiries are made of a Postmaster on this subject he will please address the inquiries are made of a Postmaster on this subject, he will please advise the inquirers in accordance with the above.

- 3. "Personal Parcel Scheme" for Prisoners of War other than officers.— The British War Office has now authorized a scheme whereby one parcel may be sent each three months by relatives in Canada direct to Prisoners of War interned abroad under the following conditions:-
- .. (1) Any of the articles noted below may be included:

Hobnails Pipe Candies (8 ozs.) Sponge Pencils Medal ribbons Tooth powder Brass polish Pomade Mittens (one pair a quarter) Cap badge and Muffler (one each year) Housewife Badges of rank Handkerchiefs (one a quarter) Shaving brush Chess Shaving soap (one stick a Safety razor quarter) Bootlaces (mohair) Health salts Dominoes Pipe lights Cloth brushes Insecticide powder Dubbin

Braces and belts (provided they are made of webbing and idelude no rubber or leather) Combs Hair brushes Tooth brushes Buttons Checkers

(2) The personal parcel may be sent once a quarter only. The maximum weight is eleven pounds. It is advised that such parcels should not weigh less than three pounds so as to minimize the risk of loss in the post.

(3) The personal parcel must be packed and despatched through the Post Office by the friend or relative of the Prisoner who receives the coupon mentioned below and the coupon

must be affixed to the parcel.

(4) A supply of coupons will be issued

(a) for Prisoners of War belonging to the Canadian Forces by the Prisoners of War Department, Canadian Red Cross Society, 14 Cockspur St., London, S.W. 1.

(b) for Civilian Prisoners of War and Prisoners of War belonging to the Imperial and Allied Forces by the Central Prisoners of War Committee, 4 Thurloe Place, London, S.W. 7. Applications should be made for these coupons immediately.

(5) The next of kin has the right to the coupon or to designate the person to whom it is to

be given.

(6) Relatives should be warned that the inclusion in the parcel of any article not mentioned

in the above list may entail the confiscation of the parcel.

The above regulations are an amendment to those issued by the Department dated November, 1917, and published in the December Supplement to the Postal Guide in so far as parcels intended for Prisoners of War other than officers are concerned.

The Postmaster is informed that these parcels which will be addressed direct to the Prisoner of War must bear a coupon, otherwise they are not to be accepted. The coupon in question bears a ring printed in blue inside of which are the words "Prisoners Personal Parcel."

The above scheme is to be added to the information as to "Communication with Prisoners of War interned abroad," published in the December, 1917, Monthly Supplement, in the section headed "Parcels for British (including Canadian) and Allied Military or Naval Prisoners (other than officers), and Parcels for Merchant Seamen and Civilians.'

- 4. Uncalled-for Newspapers and Magazines.—It is requested that when Postmasters are notifying Publishers on Form 67 B in regard to uncalled-for or refused newspapers or magazines sent from the office of publication in Canada or the United States (Postal Guide, Sec. 58, page 19, and Sec. 82, page 67,) they will be very careful to quote all numbers and letters which may appear on the address label or wrapper, as well as the name and street address of the person the paper or magazine is intended for. By complying with this request Postmasters will materially assist the Publishers in correcting their Subscription Lists.
- 5. Free Transmission of Sample Packets to and from Public Depart ments.—The attention of Postmasters is drawn to the fact that the regulation under Sec. 112 on page 28 of the Postal Guide, which prohibits the franking of Parcel Post packets, does not apply to packets of samples or botanical, entomological and mineralogical specimens, which do not weigh more than 12 oz., addressed to or sent by Dominion Government Departments at



Ottawa. Such packets when put up in the manner prescribed for Sample post, and not exceeding the 12 ounce limit of weight may pass free of postage.

- 6. War Tax on Letters, Post Cards and Parcels from Malta. A war tax of one halfpenny has been imposed by the Government of Malta on all letters and post cards, and a war tax of three pence on all parcels, addressed from Malta to any destination within the British Empire.
- 7. Prohibited Articles in Mails for Australia. The transmission to or within Australia of opuim suitable for smoking is prohibited, and gold or silver bullion, precious stones, jewellery and other precious articles cannot be transmitted otherwise than by registered letter post.
- 8. Postal Notes. Some Postal Notes of the older patterns, supplied by the Department more than five years ago, continue to be issued at some post offices,—and all Postmasters are requested to examine their stocks of postal notes so as to ascertain whether they have on hand any old pattern notes which do not contain a space for the name of the purchaser, and if so, Postmasters at non-accounting offices will please date-stamp the old pattern notes and send them to the City offices with requisitions for new postal notes (taking credit for both the commission and face value of the old pattern notes, in the same manner as in the case of spoiled notes). Postmasters at accounting offices will date-stamp the old pattern notes, enter them on the backs of dockets, take credit at item 22E, for both the commission and face value, and forward the notes and dockets with the accounts to the Department; and also if necessary send in requisitions for new supplies.
- 9. Fraud Order, Hollandich Grondkredietbank, Amsterdam, Holland.—This concern deals in so-called Credit Bonds, to which drawings are attached, and as this is of the nature of a lottery, letters to its address are not to be forwarded and money orders are not to be made payable thereto.
- 10. Racing Tips Circulars from William Walls, 141 State St., Brooklyn, N. Y., are found to be circulating in the Canadian mails, and Postmasters are warned that letters are not to be forwarded to that address and that money orders and postal notes are not to be made payable thereto.

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

- (1) November Victory Loan.—A letter has been received from the Minister of Finance thanking Postmasters and Postmistresses throughout the country for their splendid co-operation in connection with the distribution of Victory Loan literature in November last.
- (2) Pre-cancelled Stamps on Canadian Parcels.—With a view to facilitating the handling and despatch of large quantities of matter mailed in conformity with Parcel Post Regulations at the larger cities in Canada, the Department has decided to authorize, on and after the 2nd January, 1918, and until further notice, the acceptance of all such matter when prepaid by means of pre-cancelled postage stamps of the 1, 2, 5, 7 and 10 cent denominations, under the following conditions:-

(a) Persons or firms desirous of using pre-cancelled postage stamps on articles mailed under Parcel Post Regulations must make application to the Postmaster at the place of mailing for the quantity of such stamps desired. Fifty dollars worth of pre-cancelled stamps is the least amount that may be purchased at one time.

(b) The postage on an article mailed under these conditions must be entirely prepaid by means of pre-cancelled stamps, that is to say, no article will be accepted for mailing the postage on which is prepaid partly by means of pre-cancelled stamps and partly by means of ordinary postage stamps.

(c) All matter accepted under this arrangement must be presented for mailing in

accordance with the Postmaster's directions.

(3) Restriction on Newspapers and Periodicals for United Kingdom-By proclamation of the British Government, the importation into the United Kingdom of "Daily, Weekly and other periodical publications otherwise than in single copies through the post" has been prohibited.

Postmasters are accordingly requested to see that only single copies of newspapers and periodicals are accepted for transmission to addresses in the United Kingdom.

Postmasters should bring this matter to the attention of publishers who are in the habit of mailing copies of newspapers or periodicals at their offices for delivery in the United Kingdom.

(4) Previously used Postage Stamps.—The following clause is to be added to section 252, on page 54 of the Postal Guide:—

Postmasters must be careful not to place a date stamp or any cancellation mark upon a suspected stamp before sending the article to the Dead Letter Office, as any new marks upon such stamps tend to deface the marks of cancellation which they bear, and thus destroy the evidence of their previous use.

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

(1) Enquiries from Department or Post Office Inspectors should be answered promptly.—The attention of the Department has lately been drawn to a case in which a complaint from a rural subscriber to a city newspaper that he did not receive his paper regularly was referred to a Post Office Inspector for investigation, and, after over three months had elapsed, the Inspector explained that his delay in reporting on the matter was due to the difficulty he had found in obtaining replies from the Postmasters concerned.

A great deal of annoyance and adverse criticism of the postal service is caused by delay in dealing with complaints, and this might easily be avoided if Postmasters would make a point of replying promptly to enquiries. The earnest attention of Postmasters is, therefore, drawn to the importance of answering immediately any enquiry they may receive from the Department, or from the Post Office Inspector. Even if it is impossible at the moment to answer the question fully, such information as can be given should be sent without any delay.

(2) Prompt return of undelivered "request" and "address" matter required.—It has been reported to the Department that letters and other mail matter enclosed in envelopes bearing the sender's name and address, with or without a request that if not delivered the letter or other article may be returned, are being held indefinitely at many rural post offices.

The attention of Postmasters is therefore directed to the instructions respecting the treatment of "request" and "address" letters in sections 15 and 16 on page 10 of the Postal Guide, which state that if the number of days for which a "request" letter is to be held for delivery is not specified, it should be returned after 15 days, and also that "address" letters failing of delivery should be returned to the sender after 15 days (unless, in either case, the Postmaster has delivery should be returned to the sender after 15 days (unless, in either case, the Postmaster has delivery instructions from the addressee to held correspondence for a longer period, as provided written instructions from the addressee to hold correspondence for a longer period, as provided for in section 20 on page 11).

(3) Post Offices having Catch Post Service only.—The offices of Letellier and St. Jean Baptiste, Man., are to be added to the list of post offices having catch post service only.

- (4) Use of Defective Mail Bags Forbidden.—Cases have come to the notice of the Department in which torn mail bags have been used for the despatch of mail matter. This indicates a lack of care in examining the mail bags when emptying them. The use of bags badly torn or otherwise damaged so as to be unsafe for the conveyance of mail is a serious offence, and Postmasters are again warned to thoroughly examine all mail bags when emptying them, and withhold from use any found to be defective, and forward them at once to the proper bag depository for repairs.
- (5) Letters may be attached to Packets of Third Class Matter, (Samples, Printed Matter, etc.) to which they refer.—In cases where the sender especially desires that a letter relating to a package of third class matter. (samples, printed matter, etc.) sent by post should reach the addressee at the same time as the package, he may, if he so desires after prepaying the letter at letter rate of postage, attach it to the package prepaid at third class matter rate of postage, on condition that he assumes any risk that there may be of the letter being delayed in this way or of it being lost through becoming detached. It is to be noted that when a letter is attached to such a package, both must be intended for delivery to the same address, and the attached letter must be prepaid at letter rate. A Postmaster accepting a packet with a letter attached must satisfy himself that each item is correctly prepaid and must effectively cancel all the postage stamps.

The permission to attach a letter to a packet of third class matter applies to packets

addressed to the United States as well as to those for delivery within Canada.

- (6) Soldier Settlement Warrants—Warrants issued by the Soldier Settlement Board are regarded as belonging to the class of "Statements concerning Government business, Government checks, etc." which Branch Banks are allowed to send to their Head Office or their Ottawa Branch free of postage under the provisions of section 143, page 36 of the Postal Guide.
- (7) Parcel Post to North Russia—The parcel post service via England direct to North Russia (Murmansk, Archangel and Districts) has been discontinued; and parcels will in future be forwarded via England and Norway. The rates of postage until further notice will be as follows:

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

(1) Letters may be attached to Packets of Samples and Printed Matter to which they refer: In cases where the sender especially desires that a letter relating to a package of samples or printed matter sent by post should reach the addressee at the same time as the package, he may, if he so desires, after prepaying the letter at letter rate of postage, attach it to the package prepaid at third-class matter rate of postage, on condition that he assumes any risk that there may be of the letter being delayed in his way or of it being lost through becoming detached. A letter attached to such a package should bear the same address as the package, and must be prepaid at letter rate, which rate must be verified by the Postmaster, who must take care to effectively cancel the stamps on the letter as well as the stamps on the package.

This applies to packages of samples and printed matter sent by post to places within Canada

and the United States.

Vancouver Sub-Office

(2) Winter Parcel Post Rates to and from Yukon: Navigation on the Yukon River has now closed and the inland parcel post rate to and from all post offices in Yukon Territory, except White Horse, Robinson Station and Carcross will be 12 cents per pound. All other postage rates to and from Yukon Territory are the same in winter as in summer.

- (3) Winter Mail Service to Mackenzie River: The Post Office Department has arranged for mail service during the coming winter 1919-20, to Fort Resolution and Fost Simpson.
- 1. Mails will leave Edmonton on 26th November, 24th December, 22nd January, 26th February and 25th March, for Fort McMurray, Fort McKay, Fort Chipewyan, Fort Fitzgerald, Fort Smith and Fort Resolution.
- 2. Mails will leave Edmonton on 26th November, 24th December and 22nd January for Hay River, Fort Providence and Fort Simpson.
- 3. Mails will leave Edmonton on 26th November for Fort Wrigley, Fort Norman, Fort Good Hope, Arctic Red River and Fort McPnerson.

It is necessary to limit the mail matter for these despatches to registered and ordinary letters, newspapers and parcels of a reasonable weight, preference being given in every case to registered matter according to date of posting.

The value of Postage Stamps affixed to British Postal Orders must not be paid.

British Postal Orders which have been outstanding more than six months from the last day of the month of issue, or which do not bear the original printed numbers, check letters and serial numbers, will not be accepted. The holders of such Orders should return them to the remitters for repayment.

- (5) Franking Privilege to Board of Commerce.—The privilege of free transmission by post is extended to correspondence on public business addressed to or sent by the Board of Commerce, Ottawa.
- (6) Parcel Post with Alsace-Lorraine.—Parcels may now be sent to Alsace and Lorraine under the same conditions as are applicable to parcels for other parts of France.

(7) Parcel Post with Germany.—The German Post Office has given notice that samples and foodstuffs may be imported by post into Germany as follows:— Packages of samples not exceeding 12 ounces in weight (sample cards of merchandise), with-

Packages of samples not exceeding 12 ounces in weight (sample cards of merchandise), without value, intended for use in procuring orders for goods, except samples of food and table luxuries, but including samples of coffee, cocoa, sugar, raw tobacco and dried fruits.

Parcel Post packages not exceeding 11 pounds, containing foodstuffs destined for the personal use of the importer are allowed, but no package may contain more than 2 pounds of any one of the following articles:

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

(1) Canada's Victory War Loan, 1919: The Sixth Canadian War Loan, being Canada's Victory Loan of 1919, will be issued in October or November and every effort is being put forth to make it a conspicuous success.

At the request of Sir Henry Drayton, Minister of Finance, the Post Office Department has undertaken to assist in the campaign, and it has therefore been decided to permit all correspondence and literature plainly marked "Victory Loan" or "Emprunt de la victoire" to pass free of postage to or from the Dominion, Provincial or other Victory Loan Headquarters.

Postmasters will do all in their power to see that literature relating to the Victory Loan,

which they will doubtless receive in the near future, is properly distributed, and that as far as possible all the patrons of the Office are supplied with this literature.

The limit of weight prescribed in parcel post regulations, namely 11 pounds, is permitted to be disregarded in the mailing of parcels of literature which are being sent out by the Victory Loan Headquarters it being understood of course that large bundles will where possible be sent by express.

(2) Registered Mail Matter to be tied up with Registered Letter Bill Postmasters are reminded that registered articles for despatch should, when possible, be securely tied together and the registered letter bill tied with them. When a registered parcel is included in the mail, the letter bill and other registered matter if tied with the parcel should be tied over the address to prevent any possibility of the whole mail being delivered to the address shown on the parcel. If a registered parcel too large to be tied up with the letter bill and the other registered matter, is placed loose in the mail bag, a note to that effect should be written on the bill. The letter "P" (meaning parcel) should be placed opposite the entry on the letter bill, in the proper column, to indicate that there is a registered parcel loose in the mail: When a money package is despatched the letters "M.P." should be entered in this column. Whenever possible, the entry showing despatch of a registered money package should be initialled by ever possible, the entry showing despatch of a registered money package should be initialled by the postmaster and his assistant, or by two clerks.

3. Customs Declarations on Packages for Jamaica-The Postal Administration in Jamaica has given notice that parcel post packages are frequently received from Canada with an incorrect declaration of the contents and makes the request that the customs declarations attached to parcels in future be more carefully prepared and more correctly describe the contents of the individual packages.

It is declared that the customs declarations take the place of certified invoices in all parcelpost transactions and they should therefore accurately describe contents and state their exact and correct value. It is also pointed out that overvaluation involves expense and inconvenience to the addresses while undervaluation leads to the confiscation of the parcel and its contents.

Each parcel must have its own customs declaration attached, describing the contents and giving the value for that individual package, and no package will be accepted without a customs

declaration properly filled out being attached.

4. Special Tag No. 81 to be used in Despatching Empty Bags to Canadian Bag Depositories:—Postmasters are again reminded that the Department issues a special tag No. 81 to cover consignments of empty bags going forward to Canadian Bag Depositories. These tags have a space for the name and date-stamp of the despatching office and must be used by all offices when despatching empty bags to Canadian Bag Depositories. Notwithstanding the notice given in the February 1919 supplement it is found that Postmasters are not using this special tag in all cases whese it should be used. Some offices send their empty bags to the Depositories without attaching any tags whatever. This necessitates a special examination of the bags at the office of destination in order to ascertain that they actually contain "empties". This examination is quite unnecessary if the proper tags are used and Postmasters are warned that more care must be exercised in this respect in future.

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

(1) Caution—Letters Addressed to Inspectors and Assistant In-pectors of Taxation must bear Postage.—The attention of Postmisters is drawn to the fact that letters addressed to Inspectors and Assistant Inspectors of Taxation are not entitled to pass free of postage: and if a Postmaster notices that any letters so addressed have been posted unpaid at his office, he should ask the senders (where known) to pay the necessary postage.

It is most important that letters containing Income Tax Returns addressed to the Inspectors or Assistant Inspectors of Taxation should go forward promptly, and unless the postage is prepaid on such letters they have to be sent to the Dead Letter Office, thus causing delay and

inconvenience.

(2) Post Office having catch Post Service only.—The office of Lorne Creek, District of Skeena, B.C., re-opened 1st September, is to be added to the list of Post Offices having catch post service only.

(3) No Postal Notes to be remitted to the United States.—Owing to the continued high rate of exchange on New York, Postmasters are hereby instructed, until further

notice, not to sell any Postal Notes whatever for remittance to the United States.

All persons applying for Postal Notes must be questioned as to the destinations of the Notes and if it is found that an applicant intends to send Postal Notes to the United States the Postmaster must refuse to issue the Notes, and must inform the applicant that under the present regulations Postal Notes can only be used in making remittances to places in Canada and Newfoundland.

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

- (1) Window envelopes—New regulations amended.—That portion of regulation governing window envelopes which provides that stationery used or at least portion upon which exposed address appears must be white has been amended to read must be white or if colored of a very light tint or shade.
- (2) Packing of hats for transmission by parcel post.—The number of hats which have, owing to improper packing, become damaged while in course of post has recently been increasing and Postmasters are requested to point out to firms mailing large quantities of hats that these should be packed in accordance with the method prescribed in section 127, page 30, of the Canada Official Postal Guide 1919. This is the method which experience has shown to be the best.
- (3) Redirected mail to be fully addressed.—Inconvenience is frequently caused by the fact that many Postmasters when redirecting mail matter do not give the full address; for instance, if delivery through the *General Delivery* is desired directions for such delivery are rarely given. Postmasters are, therefore, instructed to inform persons tendering redirection notices that the full address—Post Office Box Number, General Delivery, or Street Address—must be given.

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

- (1) Insufficiently Prepaid Letters.—It is stated that a great many shortpaid letters are passing through the mails, and the special attention of Postmasters is, therefore, drawn to the necessity for having all unusually large or thick letters posted at or passing through their offices carefully weighed, and, if necessary, rated up, in order to ensure collection of the postage charges to which insufficiently prepaid letters are liable.
- (2) Rate of Postage on Letters for France and Belgium.—There has been a considerable increase lately in the correspondence to civilians in France and Belgium, due, no doubt, to the number of letters being written by soldiers who have returned to Canada from these places. An exceedingly large number of these letters are prepaid only three cents, but this rate, which applies to letters addressed to members of the Expeditionary Forces in France and Belgium, does not extend to letters addressed to civilians and others in these countries. The international rate of postage to France and Belgium is five cents for the first ounce and three cents for each subsequent ounce or fraction thereof, and Postmasters are requested to take all possible steps to see that this rate is made known to the patrons of their offices and observed by them.

- (3) Reduced Postage Rates on Letters and Post Cards from the United States after 1st July, 1919.—The Post Office Department of the United States has given notice that the domestic rate on letters posted in the United States has been reduced to two cents for each ounce or fraction thereof, and the rate on post cards to one cent per card. This reduction in rates takes effect 1st July, 1919, and will apply to letters and post cards mailed in the United States for Canada on and after that date.
- (4) Shortpaid Letters and Post Cards for the United States and Mexico,
 —Postmasters are informed that the second paragraph of Section 15, page 6 of the February
 1919, Supplement to the Postal Guide. should be amended to read as follows:—
- "Letters for the United States or Mexico must be prepaid, at least, three cents. If prepaid, at least, three cents, but still shortpaid, they are to be forwarded taxed with the deficiency. Post cards for the United States or Mexico must be prepaid two cents."

- (6) Removal of Restrictions on Parcels for United States Expeditionary Forces in Europe.—The order of the United States War Department prohibiting the acceptance of parcels for mailing to members of the United States Expeditionary Forces in Europe unless accompanied by approved requests of the addressees has been cancelled, and parcels not exceeding seven pounds in weight containing mailable articles, including books, may hereafter be accepted for mailing to soldiers and others, including civilians, connected with the United States Expeditionary Forces in Europe without being accompanied by a request from the addressee approved by his regimental or other commanding officer, provided the parcels are properly prepared and addressed, fully prepaid and otherwise conform to the conditions governing the transmission of mail to those Forces.

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

(1) Window Envelopes—New Regulations.

""Window envelopes, to be mailable, must be so prepared that the 'window' or transparent panel in the front through which the address on the enclosure is disclosed, shall be parallel with the length of the envelope and shall be as transparent as possible. The 'window' shall not occupy any space within 1\frac{3}{8} inches from the top nor within \frac{3}{8} of an inch from the bottom or ends of the envelope. Such envelopes shall bear the card of the sender, that is, the name and address of the sender, which shall be placed in the upper left corner of the address side. No printing around the 'window' is permissible, nor on any part of the envelope where it will interfere with a distinct postmark, rating endorsements, forwarding address, etc. The stationery used in 'window' envelopes, or at least the portion upon which the exposed address appears, must be white. The use of dark-coloured stationery in 'window' envelopes is not permissible. Nothing but the name and address of the addresses should appear on that part of the enclosure visible through the 'window.' The address should be written clearly and boldly, preferably in typewriting, with ink of a dense black or other strongly contrasting colour. Changes in address must not be made on the 'window' but on the opaque portion of the envelope. 'Window' envelopes not conforming to the foregoing are unmailable, and if mailed are to be returned to the senders through the usual channels."

In view of the representations received by the Department, to the effect that in many 'window' envelopes the transparent panel is so yellow in colour and so dim that much time is lost in deciphering the address, and that a severe strain is put upon the eyesight of postal employees, Postmasters are informed that the above regulations have been adopted and are to be enforced on and from the 1st June, 1919, and they are instructed to get in touch with the users of 'window' envelopes who are patrons of their respective offices and advise them accordingly.

In the meantime, in all cases where the address of correspondence enclosed in 'window' envelopes is not easily decipherable, the correspondence is to be set aside for special examination after other mail has been disposed of, and the matter is to be taken up with the senders with a view to a satisfactory adjustment of the trouble. In many cases enclosures are not properly folded and the address slips away from the 'window,' causing difficulty in handling, and corresponding delay in transmission, and this is one of the matters that can be adjusted by getting in touch with the users of the envelopes and informing them of the difficulty experienced.

(2) Franking Privileges of the Canada Food Board—The franking privilege enjoyed by the following Provincial offices of the Canada Food Board has been discontinued owing to the offices having been closed:

The franking privilege enjoyed by the Western Representative (J. D. McGregor) at Winnipeg, Man., has been discontinued as his office has also been closed.

- (3) Packing raw furs for mailing.—It has been observed that parcels of raw furs have been posted so packed that the ends of the furs have been exposed at the ends, affording opportunity for the abstraction of part of the contents. In one case a bundle of muskrat skins was simply bound around the middle with a paper band bearing the address. This sort of packing, if continued, is liable to lead to loss and abstraction, and Postmasters are requested to tell persons mailing furs of this danger and advise them to pack their parcels in such a way that no part of the contents will be exposed to view.
- (4) Money Orders not to be drawn upon "West Toronto."—Postmasters are informed that there is no post office called "West Toronto," Ontario, and that Money Orders should be drawn upon Station "D," Toronto, Ontario, which serves the district in

As several Money Orders intended for Station "D" Toronto have been drawn on "West Toronto," Postmasters are cautioned to always consult their Money Order Lists when issuing

Money Orders.

- (5) Post Office having catch Post Service only.—The office of Hayter, Alberta, is to be removed from the list.
- (6) Proper Methods of Addressing Newspapers and Periodicals from Office of Publication.—The following paragraph is to be added to Section 57, page 18, of the Canada Official Postal Guide for 1919:
 - "Newpapers and periodicals must be legibly addressed. It is recommended that address labels be yellow, straw coloured or buff. The addresses should be printed in clear, bold type, or be clearly typewritten or legibly written. The labels or printing should be pasted or impressed on the paper or wrapper towards the upper left hand corner in such a manner as to be readily observed by Post Office employees.

Postmasters are instructed to take up all cases of failure in this respect with publishers mailing newspapers and periodicals at their offices.

(7) Necessity of Addressing all Correspondence Fully.—Postmasters are informed that a poster will shortly be issued pointing out the necessity of addressing all correspondence fully in order to ensure prompt delivery, and advising that for delivery in cities correspondence should be addressed to street and number, post office box number or General Delivery, the address "General Delivery" to be used only when it is known that the person addressed calls at the Post Office General Delivery for mail.

Postmasters are requested to hang up the poster in a conspicuous position and call the

attention of the public to it.

(8) Sender's Name and Address should be on outside of Letters and Parcels.—It is strongly recommended that the name and address of the sender be placed on all letters and parcels, in order that if found to be undeliverable they may be returned to the sender with the least possible delay. This is particularly desirable in the case of registered articles.

Copy of a poster on this subject will shortly be sent to each post office in Canada, and Postmasters are requested to hang up the poster in a conspicuous position and draw the attention

of the public to it.

(10) War Tax on Letters from Bermdua.—The Government of Bermuda have imposed a war tax of 1d., (2 cts.) on all letters posted to other parts of the British Empire, including Canada, except letters sent by members of His Majesty's Forces not usually resident in Bermuda.

Exempted letters will bear the name, rank, and, in the case of non-commissioned officers and men, the regimental number of the sender and the office stamp of the unit to which he is attached, and may be accepted without the extra stamp for the war tax unless they are marked by the Bermuda Post Office as underpaid.

The tax is to remain in force during the war and until the 31st December in the year in which it terminates, and Postmasters will please see that insufficiently prepaid letters from

Bermuda are surcharged.

- (1) Civil Service Commission Notices to be Exhibited in Post Office Lobbies.—Civil Service Commission notices, advertising positions in the public service, will from time to time be sent to Postmasters by the Civil Service Commission, Ottawa, or by the Government Department at Ottawa interested in the advertisement, and Postmasters are instructed that they are to exhibit such notices in the lobbies of their offices, and, at the expiration of the time for advertising, they are to properly certify the forms and return them to the Department from which they were issued.
- (2) National War Savings and Thrift Stamps.—Referring to Clause 5 of the December, 1918, Supplement, Postmasters are advised that Mr. J. B. Monk, Winnipeg, has been appointed to succeed Mr. John Galt as Chairman of the Manitoba Division of the National War Savings Committee, and Mr. Monk's frank will be recognized in place of that of Mr. John Galt, withdrawn.

Mr. John Blue of Edmonton, has been appointed Vice-Chairman of the Northern Alberta Division, National War Savings Committee, and his frank will be recognized in connection with

the business of that Committee.

- (3) Parcel Mails for North Russian Expeditionary Force at Archangel—Until further notice parcels should not be accepted for transmission by post to those members of the North Russian Expeditionary Force who are based on Archangel, or whose postal address includes the indication "Elope." Letters, newspapers, &c., for these troops may continue to be accepted for transmission. There is no alteration in the postal arrangements for troops based on Murmansk or whose postal address is indicated by "Syren."
- (4) Remittances to Italy Should be made by Money Orders.—The Italian Postal Administration urges that all remittances to that country should be made by means of Money Orders, as it declines all responsibility in case of tampering with valuable enclosures in registered letters.

- (7) Japanese Parcel Post Offices in Shantung, China.—The Japanese post offices of Tainan, Tsingtau, Weihsien established in the Province of Shantung, China, have been authorized to transact International Parcel Post business. The rate will be the same as to Japan.
- (8) Removal of War Tax on Letters from Gibraltar.—The war tax of one-half penny on letters posted in Gibraltar, announced in the August 1918 Supplement to the Postal Guide, has been removed.
- (9) Increased postage of letters from Ceylon.—Postmasters are informed that the Government of Ceylon has increased the rate of postage on letters to British possessions, including Canada, from six cents to nine cents for each ounce or fraction thereof effective from the 18th of November, 1918.

Postmasters are requested to see that any insufficiently prepaid letters from Ceylon are sur-

charged.

- (10) Second-hand clothing prohibited importation into Montserrat, B. W. I.—Notice has been received from the Post Office at Montserrat, B. W. I., that the importation of any second-hand wearing apparel into Montserrat is prohibited, unless the importer produces to the Government Treasurer of the Island a certificate from the Health Officer of the port or town of export as to the innocuous nature of the articles imported.
- (11) Fraud order.—A fraud order has been issued against Prof. Sproul, 9916 St. Clair St., Cleveland, Ohio. Letters are not to be forwarded to this address; neither are Money Orders or Postal Notes to be made payable thereto.
- (12) Post Office served by catch post only, to and from which fragile parcels cannot be sent.—Hurkett, Ontario.
- (13) Sugar—Removal of British import restrictions.—Departmental instructions given in Section 3, Page 5 of the March 1918 Supplement to the Postal Guide are now cancelled, as the British Government advises that the rule limiting to one pound the amount of sugar which could be imported by parcel post has been relaxed and that no objection will be raised to such importations provided the quantity is reasonable.
- (14) Franking privilege extended to Canadian Trade Commission.—The privilege of free transmission by post has been extended to correspondence on public business addressed to or sent by the Canadian Trade Commission, Ottawa.

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

(1) Removal of British Import Restrictions on Newspapers and printed Matter.—Departmental instructions given in Section 2, page 4 of the April 1918 Supplement to the Postal Guide are now cancelled on account of the removal of the British Import Restrictions.

Packages not exceeding 5 pounds in weight, containing newspapers and printed matter, prepaid at the usual rates applicable under the postal classification, may now be accepted for transmission to addresses in the United Kingdom. Parcels not exceeding 11 pounds in weight,

prepaid at parcel post rates, may also be accepted.

(2) Removal of Canadian Export Restrictions on Articles sent by Mail.—The Canadian Export Restrictions described in Departmental circular of the 27th February 1918 and in Section 1 of the May 1918 Supplement to the Postal Guide have now been removed as regards articles sent by mail, and Postmasters will, therefore, please note that in future no export license will be required from the War Trade Board, Canada, or the Canada Food Board for articles mailed to other countries.

Although no export licenses will in future be required, an import license from the country

of destination must still be obtained when this is necessary,

(3) Cancellation of Postage Stamps.—Notwithstanding repeated instructions calling for the observance of greater care in the cancellation of postage stamps, many uncancelled stamps are still noticed on letters and other articles passing through the mail, and Postmasters are, therefore, again requested to see that every effort is put forth to make clear and definite impressions with the postage stamp canceller on the postage stamps of all letters and other mail matter posted at their offices. In order to obtain proper results the following points should be observed:—

Keep all stamping pads well inked. Shake the ink tin thoroughly before placing the ink on the pad. Rubehe ink in well with the wooden "muller". Do not allow stamping pads to become too much worn to properly hold the ink. Apply to the Department for new stamping pads before the old ones are too much worn.

The cancellation of postage stamps is regarded by the Department as a duty of first importance as the revenue of the Department is vitally concerned, and, unless there is a marked mprovement, it will be necessary to take rigorous measures to ensure the more careful performnce of this duty.

- (4) Fragile Articles despatched by Registered Mail.—Postmasters are instructed that registered parcels containing articles of a fragile nature are to be properly labelled with a "fragile" sticker, and when enclosed in a locked bag such bag must bear a tag indicating that the contents are of a fragile character.
- (5) Postmasters not to witness the enclosing of Money in Registered Letters.—It is not desirable that Postmasters should act as witness to the enclosing of money in registered letters sent by patrons of their offices, and this practice, if indulged in, should be discontinued.
- (6) Special Tag No. 81 to be used in despatching Empty Bags to Canadian Bag Depositories.—Postmasters are informed that the Department issues a special tag, No. 81, to cover consignments of empty bags going forward to Canadian bag depositories. These tags have a space for the name and date-stamp of the despatching office, and it is desired that they should be used by all offices when despatching empty bags to Canadian bag depositories.

Postmasters will make a requisition on the Controller of Postal Stores for a supply of these

tags to meet the needs of their offices.

- (7) A. R. Form for place outside of Canada not necessarily signed by Addressee or His Representative.—It appears that in a considerable number of cases requests are made to have A. R. forms, which have been sent out with international registered articles and duly returned to Canada, forwarded again to destination for the purpose of obtaining the addressee's signature, when the signature is omitted, and Postmasters are informed that Postal Union Regulations provide that an A. R. form must be signed by the addressee, or if the regulations of the country of destination permit, by the postal official of the office of delivery. This means that outside of Canada the form is complete when either one of the two conditions mentioned is fulfilled.
- (8) Back-stamping of Registered Letters.—The Department has learned that registered letters frequently reach the addressees without having been back-stamped over the flap by the post offices through which they have passed, as required by Section 160, page 41 of the Postal Guide, reading:
 - "Postmasters should examine carefully all registered letters passing through their offices, as well as all registered letters posted at or received for delivery from their offices, and should back-stamp them distinctly over the flap of the envelope."

Postmasters are enjoined to see that this regulation is strictly adhered to in their offices. The back-stamping of each registered letter is highly important, as failure in this respect might mean that essential information would be lacking should enquiry be made concerning that letter.

- (9) Parcel Post Rates to Ecuador.—The rates for parcels transmitted via England and Pacific Steam Navigation Line direct, given on page 118 of the Canada Official Postal Guide 1918, have been cancelled for the present.

 Postmasters will please note that, until further advised, only the rates (also given on page 118) for parcels despatched via England, Elder and Fyffes and Pacific Steam Navigation Line to Colon, etc., will apply to parcels for Ecuador.
- (10) Soldiers parcels sent overseas and returned not liable to additional postage.—Postmasters are informed that parcels sent to soldiers overseas and returned for delivery to them in Canada or to the senders, will not be liable to additional postage.
- (11.) Sender's name and address to be placed on letters and parcels for soldiers.—As demobilization is proceeding rapidly, it is strongly recommended that the name and address of the sender be placed on all letters and parcels that are being sent overseas to our soldiers, in order that if found to be undeliverable they may be returned to the sender with the least possible delay.
 - (12) Mail services resumed.-

Alsace-Lorraine: Letter and paper mail (both ordinary and registered) has now been resumed to Alsace-Lorraine, but the parcel post service is still suspended.

Belgium: Letter and paper mail (both ordinary and registered) and parcel post mail have been resumed.

Russia: Letter and paper mail for Amur Province, the Provinces on the East Coast of Siberia and Russian Sakhalin has been resumed, and such mail may be accepted and forwarded on Vancouver.

(13) War tax and new postage rates on mail from Nyasaland.—Postmasters are informed that the Government of Nyasaland Protectorate, which is not included in the Postal Union, has imposed a war tax of one penny on all letters and post cards posted in the Protectorate for delivery in other parts of the world. Letters and post cards addressed to any member of His Majesty's Naval or Military Forces on active service will be exempt from these charges.

The Nyasaland Government have at the same time reduced the unit of weight for letters delivered within the Empire from one ounce to half an ounce, and have also revised the unit of

weight for other postal matter as follows:

Newspapers: The initial rate of one penny for two ounces remains unchanged, but for each successive two ounces the rate is reduced from one penny to one halfpenny.

Sample packets: The minimum charge of two pence is abolished. The new rate is one penny for two ounces and one penny for each additional two ounces, the maximum weight being increased from twelve ounces to five pounds.

Commercial papers: The new rate is twopence-half-penny for packets not exceeding four ounces, three pence for packets not exceeding six ounces, with one penny for each additional two ounces.

These new rates took effect as from the 16th of September 1918. Postmasters are requested to see that any insufficiently prepaid items from Nyasaland Protectorate coming under any of the above classifications are surcharged.

(14) Illegal lotteries in Montreal, P.Q.—Letters are being received from the United States addressed to Canadien Lotterie, Royal Art, Montreal, Canada and Metropolitan Lottery Company, Montreal, P.Q.

All such letters are to be sent to the Dead Letter Office for return to the senders marked

" Prohibited."

(15) Short-paid letters and post cards to be rated and sent forward.— Postmasters are informed that in future short-paid letters and post cards, whether it is the war tax or postage that is lacking, are to be rated up and sent forward subject to the collection of double the deficiency from the addressees.

Letters for the United States must be prepaid at least 3c. If prepaid at least 3c., but still short-paid, they are to be forwarded taxed with the deficiency. Post cards for the United States

must be prepaid 2c.

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

(1) Letters may be attached to Parcels to which they refer.—In cases where the sender is specially desirous that a letter relating to a parcel sent by post should reach the addressee at the same time as the parcel, he may, if he so desires, after prepaying the letter at letter rate of postage, attach it to the parcel prepaid at Parcel Post rates, on condition that he assumes any risk there may be of the letter being delayed in this way, or of it becoming detached and being lost in the parcel mails. A letter attached to a parcel must bear the same address as the parcel, must refer solely to the contents of the parcel, and must be prepaid at letter rate, which rate must be verified by the Postmaster who must take care to effectively cancel the stamps on the letter as well as the stamps on the parcel.

This applies to parcels sent by post to places within Canada and the United States.

(2) Live Bees.—Queen bees and their attendant bees, when accompanied with a copy of a certificate of the current year from a Government apiary inspector to the effect that the apiary from which said queen bees are shipped is free from disease, or by a copy of a statement by the beekeeper, made before a notary public or other officer having a seal, that the honey used in making the candy used in the queen mailing cage has been diluted and boiled in a closed vessel, may be sent in the mails when so put up as to render it practically impossible that the package shall be broken in transit, or the persons handling the same be injured, or the mail bags or their contents soiled.

Honey bees in quantities may be sent in the mails under the same conditions as are prescribed for queen bees and their attendant bees when delivery can be made to the addresses within a period of five days. If the cages are wooden the material of which they are constructed shall not be less than three-eighths of an inch thick and the saw cuts therein or space between

slats shall not be over one-eighth of an inch wide; if wire screen is used for the sides of the cages there shall be two thicknesses of screen separated by slats at least three-eighths of an inch in thickness. The container shall be provided with a suitable handle, and no honeycomb, water or liquid food shall be placed therein. Such parcels shall be transported outside of mail bags.

- (3) Postage Stamps not to be used for making Remittances.—Postage stamps are NOT to be used for making remittances, that is, they are not to be sent in quantity to Mail Order Firms in payment for goods, etc., as this is contrary to Post Office regulations.

 It is pointed out that Postal Notes for 20c., 25c., 30c., 40c., etc., up to \$10, can be readily obtained at the Post Office, and this latter method of remitting small amounts is strongly recommended as being especially convenient for the sender and for the person receiving the amount.
- (4) Winter Mail Service to Mackenzie River.—With reference to Section 2, page 4, of the October, 1918, Supplement to the Canada Official Postal Guide, in which it was stated that mails would leave Edmonton on the 27th January, 1919, for Fort McMurray, Fort McKay, Fort Chipewyan, Fort Fitzgerald, Fort Smith, Fort Resolution, Fort Providence, Hay River, and Fort Simpson, Postmasters are informed that mails for these points will leave Edmonton on Friday, the 24th January, instead of Monday, the 27th, as previously announced.
- (5) National War Savings and Thrift Stamps.—Referring to Paragraph 5 of the December (1918) Monthly Supplement, regarding the franking privilege conferred on the Chairmen of the Provincial Committees, National War Savings and Thrift Stamps, the following is a list of Provincial Chairmen appointed so far:—

- (6) Franking Privilege extended to Repatriation and Employment Committee—The privilege of free transmission by post is extended to correspondence on public business addressed to or sent by the Repatriation and Employment Committee, Ottawa.
- (7) Franking and Free Mail Matter.—The Canadian Seed Growers' Association, Department of Agriculture, and the Controller of Revenue and Controller of Expenditure, Department of the Interior, have been added to the list of Branches or Divisions of the Public Departments at Ottawa, to and from which correspondence on official business may pass free of postage—See 1918 Postal Guide, Section 146, page 37.
- (8) Post Offices having Catch Post Service only—The office of Brynmarl, B.C., is to be added to the list of offices served by catch post only (indicated in the alphabetical list of post offices in Part II of the Postal Guide by the sign ‡ placed in front of the name), to and from which fragile parcels must not be sent.
- (9) Uncalled, for Newspapers and Magazines.—It has come to the attention of the Department that many Postmasters are not observing the instructions given in Section 4,

page 6 of the February, 1918, Supplement to the Postal Guide, to furnish on Form 67-B the key numbers and all other particulars appearing on the address labels or wrappers of publications which have been refused by the addressees, and Postmasters are requested to see that these instructions are carefully observed in future.

It is pointed out, also, that there is still room for improvement in the manner in which Form 67-B is filled out and date stamped. It is desired to prevent any grounds for future complaint, and Postmasters are requested to exercise particular care in the performance of this duty.

(10) Mail addressed to Canadian Forces in North Russia. –Letters. parcels and other mail matter may be forwarded via England. Address:

All classes of mail should be addressed as follows:-

(a) Regimental number (b) Rank

(c) Name

(d) Squadron, Battery or Company

(e) Battalion, Regiment (or other unit), Staff Appointment or Department

(f) Canadian Contingent.

(g) North Russian Expeditionary Force.(h) Army Post Office, London, England.

Rates of postage:

Letters: -2 cents for each ounce or fraction thereof with 1 cent additional as war tax on each letter. The sender's name and address should be shown on letters in order that they may be returned if undeliverable.

Newspapers:—1 cent for each 2 ounces or fraction thereof.

Parcels:—1 lb. 50 cts. 4 lbs. 82 cts. 2 " 58 " 3 " 66 " 5 " 90 " " 98 " · \$1.06.

Limit of weight, 7 pounds.

It is necessary that all parcels should be carefully and securely packed and it is recommended that an outer cover of linen, calico, or canvas should be securely sewn up. The address should be written in bold letters on the cover in ink or indelible pencil and not on a label whether tied or pasted on.

(11) Mail Posted in Canada to members of the United States Expeditionary Forces in France.—With reference to Section 1, page 4 of the September, 1917, Supplement to the Canada Official Postal Guida, Postmasters are informed that letters, newspapers and parcels for the United States Expeditionary Forces in France are now being dealt with in the Chelsea Terminal Railway Post Office, New York.

Postmasters are, therefore, to forward all mail for the United States Expeditionary Forces

in France in the regular mails to the United States Railway Mail Service. Where the quantity warrants it, letters are to be made up in face slipped packages, and papers and parcels in bags,

labelled:

Chelsea Terminal Railway Post Office. New York, For American Expeditionary Forces.

(12) Parcel Post for United Kingdom not to be Registered.-Postmasters are reminded that parcels forwarded to the United Kingdom by Parcel Post must NOT be registered.

Packages sent as letter packets prepaid at the letter rate of postage may be accepted at the sender's risk to go forward by letter post and these may be registered. No Customs Declarations

should be attached to such packages.

- (13) Demurrage Charge on Dutiable Parcels in Japan.—The Japanese Post Office Department announces that a demurrage charge will be collected from the addressees for parcels on which Customs duties or Inland taxes are imposed in Japan, not withdrawn from the post office within twenty days from the date of the notice of arrival sent to the addressees.
- (14.)—Articles Prohibited from Importation into Japan by Mail.—The restriction on the importation of rice into Japan announced in Section 9, page 6 of the June Supplement to the 1918 Postal Guide, is cancelled.

The following is to be added to the list of articles prohibited from transmission to Japan by

mail, on pages 85 and 133 of the 1918 Postal Guide:

Quina, quinine chloride and quinine sulphate, except such as may be imported with the permission of the Minister for Home Affairs. This prohibition is not applicable to those which will be imported into Taiwan (Formosa) and Karafuto (Japanese Sagh-

Denmark-except the service via England and Norway,

French Congo.

Persia-No services in operation except those to Indian Post Office Agencies and to Persian Post Offices in Southern Persia via England and India.

Portugal-Except the service via England, France and Spain.

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

(1) Removal of British Import Restrictions on Newspapers and printed Matter.—Departmental instructions given in Section 2, page 4 of the April 1918 Supplement to the Postal Guide are now cancelled on account of the removal of the British Import Restrictions.

Packages not exceeding 5 pounds in weight, containing newspapers and printed matter, prepaid at the usual rates applicable under the postal classification, may now be accepted for transmission to addresses in the United Kingdom. Parcels not exceeding 11 pounds in weight,

prepaid at parcel post rates, may also be accepted.

(2) Removal of Canadian Export Restrictions on Articles sent by Mail.—The Canadian Export Restrictions described in Departmental circular of the 27th Rebruary 1918 and in Section 1 of the May 1918 Supplement to the Postal Guide have now been removed as regards articles sent by mail, and Postmaeters will, therefore, please note that in future no export license will be required from the War Trade Board, Canada, or the Canada Food Board for articles mailed to other countries.

Although no export licenses will in future be required, an import license from the country

of destination must still be obtained when this is necessary.

(3) Cancellation of Postage Stamps.—Notwithstanding repeated instructions calling for the observance of greater care in the cancellation of postage stamps, many uncancelled stamps are still noticed on letters and other articles passing through the mail, and Postmasters are, therefore, again requested to see that every effort is put forth to make clear and definite impressions with the postage stamp canceller on the postage stamps of all letters and other mail matter posted at their offices. In order to obtain proper results the following points should be observed:—

Keep all stamping pads well inked. Shake the ink tin thoroughly before placing the ink on the pad. Rub the ink in well with the wooden "muller". Do not allow stamping pads to become too much worn to properly hold the ink. Apply to the Department for new stamping pads before the old ones are too much worn.

The cancellation of postage stamps is regarded by the Department as a duty of first interportance as the revenue of the Department is vitally concerned, and, unless there is a marked mprovement, it will be necessary to take rigorous measures to ensure the more careful performance of this duty.

- (4) Fragile Articles despatched by Registered Mail.—Postmasters are instructed that registered parcels containing articles of a fragile nature are to be properly labelled with a "fragile" sticker, and when enclosed in a locked bag such bag must bear a tag indicating that the contents are of a fragile character.
- (5) Postmasters not to witness the enclosing of Money in Registered Letters.—It is not desirable that Postmasters should act as witness to the enclosing of money in registered letters sent by patrons of their offices, and this practice, if indulged in, should be discontinued.
- (6) Special Tag No. 81 to be used in despatching Empty Bags to Canadian Bag Depositories.—Postmasters are informed that the Department issues a special tag, No. 81, to cover consignments of empty bags going forward to Canadian bag depositories. These tags have a space for the name and date-stamp of the despatching office, and it is desired that they should be used by all offices when despatching empty bags to Canadian bag depositories.

Postmasters will make a requisition on the Controller of Postal Stores for a supply of these

tags to meet the needs of their offices.

- (7) A. R. Form for place outside of Canada not necessarily signed by Addressee or His Representative.—It appears that in a considerable number of cases requests are made to have A. R. forms, which have been sent out with international registered articles and duly returned to Canada, forwarded again to destination for the purpose of obtaining the addressee's signature, when the signature is omitted, and Postmasters are informed that Postal Union Regulations provide that an A. R. form must be signed by the addressee, or if the regulations of the country of destination permit, by the postal official of the office of delivery. This means that outside of Canada the form is complete when either one of the two conditions mentioned is fulfilled.
- (8) Back-stamping of Registered Letters.—The Department has learned that registered letters frequently reach the addressees without having been back-stamped over the flap by the post offices through which they have passed, as required by Section 160, page 41 of the Postal Guide, reading:
 - "Postmasters should examine carefully all registered letters passing through their offices, as well as all registered letters posted at or received for delivery from their offices, and should back-stamp them distinctly over the flap of the envelope."

Postmasters are enjoined to see that this regulation is strictly adhered to in their offices. The back-stamping of each registered letter is highly important, as failure in this respect might mean that essential information would be lacking should enquiry be made concerning that letter.

- (9) Parcel Post Rates to Ecuador.—The rates for parcels transmitted via England and Pacific Steam Navigation Line direct, given on page 118 of the Canada Official Postal Guide 1918, have been cancelled for the present.

 Postmasters will please note that, until further advised, only the rates (also given on page 118) for parcels despatched via England, Elder and Fyffes and Pacific Steam Navigation Line to Colon, etc., will apply to parcels for Ecuador.
- (10) Soldiers parcels sent overseas and returned not liable to additional postage.—Postmasters are informed that parcels sent to soldiers overseas and returned for delivery to them in Canada or to the senders, will not be liable to additional postage.
- (11.) Sender's name and address to be placed on letters and parcels for soldiers.—As demobilization is proceeding rapidly, it is strongly recommended that the name and address of the sender be placed on all letters and parcels that are being sent overseas to our soldiers, in order that if found to be undeliverable they may be returned to the sender with the least possible delay.
 - (12) Mail services resumed.-

Alsace-Lorraine: Letter and paper mail (both ordinary and registered) has now been resumed to Alsace-Lorraine, but the parcel post service is still suspended.

Belgium: Letter and paper mail (both ordinary and registered) and parcel post mail have been resumed.

Russia: Letter and paper mail for Amur Province, the Provinces on the East Cost of Siberia and Russian Sakhalin has been resumed, and such mail may be accepted and Lowerded on Vancouver.

(13) War tax and new postage rates on mail from Nyasaland.—Postmasters are informed that the Government of Nyasaland Protectorate, which is not included in the Postal Union, has imposed a war tax of one penny on all letters and post cards posted in the Protectorate for delivery in other parts of the world. Letters and post cards addressed to any member of His Majesty's Naval or Military Forces on active service will be exempt from these charges.

The Nyasaland Government have at the same time reduced the unit of weight for letters delivered within the Empire from one ounce to half an ounce, and have also revised the unit of

weight for other postal matter as follows:

Newspapers: The initial rate of one penny for two ounces remains unchanged, but for each successive two ounces the rate is reduced from one penny to one halfpenny.

Sample packets: The minimum charge of twopence is abolished. The new rate is one penny for two ounces and one penny for each additional two ounces, the maximum weight being increased from twelve ounces to five pounds.

Commercial papers: The new rate is twopence-half-penny for packets not exceeding four ounces, three pence for packets not exceeding six ounces, with one penny for each additional two ounces.

These new rates took effect as from the 16th of September 1918.

Postmasters are requested to see that any insufficiently prepaid items from Nyasaland Protectorate coming under any of the above classifications are surcharged.

(14) Illegal lotteries in Montreal, P.Q.—Letters are being received from the United States addressed to Canadien Lotterie, Royal Art, Montreal, Canada, and Metropolitan Lottery Company, Montreal, P.Q.

All such letters are to be sent to the Dead Letter Office for return to the senders marked

"Prohibited."

(15) Short-paid letters and post cards to be rated and sent forward.—Postmasters are informed that in future short-paid letters and post cards, whether it is the war tax or postage that is lacking, are to be rated up and sent forward subject to the collection of double the deficiency from the addressees.

Letters for the United States must be prepaid at least 3c. If prepaid at least 3c., but still short-paid, they are to be forwarded taxed with the deficiency. Post cards for the United States

must be prepaid 2c.

Any Postmaster who does not receive a copy of the Monthly Supplement each month is requested to notify the Controller of Postal Stores, Ottawa.

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS

(1) Newspaper Rates of Postage on and after 1st January, 1921.—Postmasters are advised that according to the amendments to the Post Office Act passed at the last session of Parliament, the following newspaper rates of postage will apply on and after the 1st January, 1921:—

General rate from office of publication to. per lb. (a) Newspapers and periodicals, printed and published in Canada daily, three times a week, twice a week, weekly, fortnightly or monthly, sent from the office of publication and addressed to regular subscribers and to newsdealers, resident elsewhere than in the place of publication, will be subject to postage at the rate of three-quarters of a cent per pound.

Postmasters will please amend accordingly Section 40, page 12, of the 1920 Canada Official Postal Guide.

Free area for weeklies, etc., restricted. (b) Exception is made, however, in the case of newspapers and periodicals published weekly, fortnightly or monthly in any city, town or village which has a population of not more than 10,000 persons, and they will be entitled to transmission by mail free of postage to the extent of a circulation of 2,500 copies per issue within a distance of forty miles from their place of publication. In all cases, the centre of the area for free distribution will be the place of publication. Such newspapers and periodicals, however, in excess of 2,500 copies per issue, or required to be transmitted beyond the forty-mile zone, will be subject to postage at the rate given in (a).

Postmasters will please amend accordingly Section 41, page 12, of the 1920 Canada Official Postal Guide.

Daily newspapers for United States 2c. per lb. (c) Daily newspapers published in Canada and mailed by publishers to subscribers in the United States will be subject to postage at the rate of two cents per pound.

Postmasters will please amend accordingly Section 43, page 12, and Section 81, page 70, of the 1920 Canada Official Postal Guide

Periodicals issued less frequently than monthly 2c. per lb. (d) Newspapers and periodicals issued less frequently than once a month, will be subject to postage at the rate of two cents per pound.

Postmasters will please amend accordingly Section 44, page 12, of the 1920 Canada Official Postal Guide.

Posted by newsdealers 2c. per lb. (e) Newspapers and periodicals posted by newsdealers and addressed to subscribers or to other newsdealers, will be subject to postage at the rate of two cents per pound.

Postmasters will please amend accordingly Section 54, page 15, of the 1920 Canada Official Postal Guide.

Sample copies 2c. per lb. (f) Specimen or sample copies of newspapers and periodicals sent from the office of publication will be subject to postage at the rate of two cents per pound.

Postmasters will please amend accordingly Sections 61 and 62, pages 16 and 17, and Section 59, page 67, of the 1920 Canada Official Postal Guide.

(2) Careful Attention to be given Income Tax Notices and Forms:—Postmasters are informed that it is very important that Income Tax notices and forms sent out by the Inspectors of Taxation should be delivered promptly, or, if undeliverable, should be returned without any delay to the Inspector of Taxation by whom they were posted with the reason for non-delivery distinctly stated.

Postmasters are, therefore, instructed, when any letter posted by an Inspector of Taxation cannot be delivered to the person addressed, or cannot be re-directed in accordance with that person's written instructions, to write on the envelope as full information as possible, instead of merely marking it "Not called for", and to return it promptly.

(3) International Reply Coupons.—Postmasters are cautioned not to sell more than five International Reply Coupons to any one person not known to them, and only a limited number to persons who are known, and to refuse to exchange for Canadian postage stamps unusually large quantities of foreign coupons presented at their offices without first referring the matter to the Department.

Schmidt, neither are Money Orders or Postal Notes to be made payable thereto.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR POSTMASTERS-Concluded

(11) Ballot Boxes used in Dominion Elections or for Canada Temperance Act Votes under Dominion Elections Act.—Ballot Boxes used in Dominion Elections or for Canada Temperance Act Votes under the Dominion Elections Act, may, on or subsequent to polling day, be sent through the mails from Deputy Returning Officers to Returning Officers registered, free of postage, in accordance with Section 66 (8) of the Dominion Elections Act, but there is no provision in the Act whereby Returning Officers may send Ballot Boxes through the mails, free of postage to Deputy Returning Officers, such shipments being liable to postage at parcel post rates.

Keys of Ballot Boxes in special envelopes addressed to Returning Officers and containing on their face a statement that such envelope has enclosed a key to the Ballot Box for a specified Polling Division may similarly be sent through the mails, registered, free of postage.

These regulations, however, do not apply to Provincial Elections.

(1) Ballot Boxes Liable to Parcel Post Rates when sent by Returning Officers to Deputy Returning Officers.—In Section 2, page 5 of the August Supplement it was stated that ballot boxes for Dominion Elections or Canada Temperance Act votes mailed on or after polling day by Deputy Returning Officers to Returning Officers are entitled to transmission free of postage under Section 63 (8) of the Dominion Elections Act. Postmasters will please note that this does not apply to ballot boxes sent by the Returning Officers before polling day to the Deputy Returning Officers, which must be prepaid at parcel post rates.

(8) Parcel Post to British Togoland:—Part of Togoland hitherto under British Military Administration was transferred to French Administration on the 1st October, 1920, and the only part now remaining under British Administration will be that including the towns of Ho, Kpandu, Kete Kratchie and Yendi, parcels for which may continue to be accepted at the rates for British Togoland given on page 188 of the 1920 Postal Guide.

(6) Direct exchange of Parcel Post Resumed with France.—The Postmasters are informed that the direct exchange of parcel post between Canada and France, which was interrupted owing to the difficulty of maintaining a regular steamship service during the war, has now been resumed, arrangements having been made for the sea conveyance of these parcels from Canada by steamers of the Canadian Pacific Ocean Services, Limited, sailing direct to Havre, and from France by steamers of the Compagnie Générale Transatlantique and the Canadian Pacific Ocean Services, Limited.

The rates of postage on parcels posted in Canada for transmission by this direct route will

The regulations as to packing, Customs declarations and prohibited articles are the same as for parcels for France sent via England.

Parcels to be forwarded by this direct steamship service to France should be diverted on Montreal in summer, and on Montreal and Halifax or St. John in winter.

While the charges for the conveyance of parcels by the direct service are lower than for the service via England, the direct service is less frequent and the choice of the route should be left to the senders. Persons wishing to forward parcels by this direct route should bear this in mind.

- (1) Provincial Franking Privileges for collection of Vital Statistics and statistics of communicable diseases retained.—With reference to Section 13, page 5 of the July, 1920. Supplement in regard to Provincial Franking privileges being abolished, the Postmaster is informed that the portion of Section 150 of the 1920 Postal Guide relating to the collection of Vital Statistics and communicable diseases has also been retained.
 - "Returns mailed to the Provincial Governments in relation to communicable diseases, also forms used by clergymen, medical men and others, when making returns of marriages, births and deaths, and (in the Province of Quebec) parish registers containing written entries of births, marriages and internments which clergymen send each year to the Prothonotary of their district, and which the Prothonotary sends blank to clergymen, are allowed to pass free of postage; but should registration be required, the usual charge of 10 cents must be prepaid by stamps in every case."
- (2) Franking of Free Mail Matter.—The following branches of the Department of the Secretary of State should be added to the list of branches in that Department to which correspondence on public business may be sent free of postage under Section 148, page 35 of the 1920 Postal Guide:—

Clearing Office.—Department of the Secretary of State, Ottawa. Internment Office.—Department of the Secretary of State, Ottawa.

(3) Registered Mail Matter for Turkey.—The Turkish Post Office announces that, in present circumstances, the safety of registered mail matter in the post in Turkey cannot be guaranteed. Registered mail matter for Turkey can, therefore, be accepted only at the risk of the sender.

- (4) Registered Mail Matter for Poland.—The Polish Post Office announces that, in present circumstances, the safety of registered mail matter in the post in Poland cannot be guaranteed. Registered mail matter for Poland can, therefore, be accepted only at the risk of the sender.
- (5) Registered Mail Matter for Argentine Republic—It is reported that registered mail matter containing paper money, coupons, titles payable to bearer often reach destination in damaged condition.

Senders are strongly advised to use strong solid envelopes when sending paper money, etc. to the Argentine Republic.

(6) All Correspondence to and from Military Forces Overseas and His Majesty's Ships and Allied Warships must now be fully prepaid.—Postmasters are informed that the privilege of exemption from postal charges granted, as announced in Departmental circulars of the 28th July, 1917, and 11th October, 1918, to correspondence posted by soldiers in British Dominion, Colonial and Allied Military Forces Overseas, and by officers and men serving in His Majesty's ships or Allied warships, has, with effect from the 1st July, 1920, been withdrawn, except in the case of letters from members of the British Forces in Mesopotamia and Army of the Black Sea, for which the privilege has been extended until 1st October, 1920.

Postmasters will please note, therefore, that all letters posted to and from any Military Forces overseas, or His Majesty's ships or allied warships, must, with the exceptions mentioned,

be fully prepaid with postage stamps.

This notice cancels all previous instructions on this subject.

(7) Parcel Post to Persia—Extension of Service.—Parcels may now be sent to any part of Persia, and not only to places in South Persia, through the Persian Post Office.

Every parcel for Persia intended for delivery through the Persian Post Office must be addressed Poste Restante at one of the five following Persian offices:—Bushire (Bouchir), Bender Abbas (Bunder Abbas), Lingah, Mohammerah and Kuh-Malek-Siah. Parcels should be addressed in the following form:—

The privilege of free transmission by post is extended to correspondence on public business addressed to, or sent by the Chief Electoral Officer at Ottawa, and this name is to be added to the list on pages 36 to 39 of the 1920 Canada Official Postal Guide, of the Public Departments and of principal divisions or branches thereof, correspondence addressed to which on public business may be forwarded free of postage.

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

- (1) Post Offices having Catch Post Service Only:-The office of Timberlea, N.S., should be added to the list of post offices having catch post service only.
- (2) Direct Exchange of Parcel Post with Union of South Africa.—Postmasters are informed that a direct exchange of parcels by post between Canada and the Union of South Africa will come into operation on the 1st July proximo. This will be in addition to the existing parcel post exchange by way of England.

The direct parcel mails from Canada will be made up at Montreal during the summer season, and St. John during the winter, and will be despatched by steamers operated under contract with the Elder Dempster and Company, Limited.

The rate of postage on parcels fron Canada to South Africa by direct route is 18 cents for each pound or fraction of a pound.

The regulations as to packing, customs declarations, prohibited articles, etc. will be

the same as for parcels sent by way of England.

The frequency of the service will be monthly, and parcels prepaid for despatch by this direct route should be diverted on Montreal in summer and on St. John in winter.

(3) Increased Postage of Letters from United Kingdom.—The letter postage from the United Kingdom has, effective 1st June, 1920, been raised to two pence (4 cents) for the first ounce and one penny (2 cents) for each additional ounce.

Surcharges should be collected according to British Post Office markings.

Postage on letters from the United Kingdom addressed to His Majesty's ships and troops abroad remains unaltered for the present.

(4) Yarcel Post Rates to Czecho-Slovakia Reduced.—The parcel post rates to Czecho-Slovakia have been reduced and until further notice will be as follows:—

- (5) Packets of Pictorial Postcards not Permitted Entry as Printed Matter to Belgium, Sweden and Poland.-Packages of illustrated postcards are not admitted as printed matter to Belgium, Sweden and Poland. Postmasters are requested to insert this prohibition opposite the countries named in the Table of Rates and Conditions in the 1920 Postal Guide at pages 81, 95 and 100 respectively.
- (6) Belgium and Luxembourg-Prohibited Articles.—The importation of opium into Belgium by Post is prohibited. Cocaine, morphine and heroin are also prohibited by Letter Post, but may be sent by Parcel Post to persons specially authorized to receive these drugs. Opium is prohibited from importation into Luxembourg by Parcel Post.
- (7) Goods for Northern Persia. Goods can no longer be accepted for transmission by Letter Post to Northern Persia. As the Parcel Post has not yet been re-opened, there is no means, for the present, of sending goods through the post to the north of Persia. This cancels the notice given in Section 6, page 5 of the May 1920 Supplement.
- (8) Parcel Post with Brazil-Extension to Manaos.-Parcels addressed to Manaos, Brazil, can now be accepted for transmission by parcel post and the name of these offices should, therefore, be added to the list of post offices to which parcels can be delivered given on page 113 under the Table of Parcel Post Rates to Foreign Countries. The rates of postage and general conditions applicable to such parcels are the same as those in force for parcels for other places in Brazil.
- (9) Malta—Removal of War Tax and Change in Letter Postage.—The War Tax of one half penny on all letters and of three pence on all parcels posted in Malta—see Section 6, page 7, February, 1918 Supplement to the Postal Guide has been withdrawn, with effect from 1st June, 1920, and the rates of postage on letters addressed to any destination within the British Empire have been revised, with effect from the same date as follows:—

- (10) Nyasaland—Removal of War Tax.—The War Tax of one penny on letters and post-cards posted in Nyasaland Protectorate to any destination—see Section 13, page 6, February 1919 Supplement has been withdrawn, with effect from the 1st January, 1920.
- (11) Numbering of Registered Articles at Office of Origin.—In the printed instructions affixed inside the cover of the book in which registered letters mailed are recorded, it is pointed out that special importance attaches to the original number given at the office of posting, and the Postmaster is instructed to inscribe the original number on the top left hand corner of the address and to encircle it with an "O" or ring to distinguish it from numbers that may be subsequently added. The date stamp of the office of origin is to be clearly impressed by the side of the original number.

Postmasters are particularly requested to see that these instructions are faithfully carried

out in their offices.

(12) Registration Fee 10 Cents, on and after 15th July, 1920.—According to an amendment to the Post Office Act passed during the recent session of Parliament, the Registration Fee on letters and other matter mailed in Canada is fixed at ten (10c.) cents per each letter or article.

Postmasters will please amend accordingly, pages 4, 40, 60, 65, 72 and 78 of the 1920 Postal

Guide.

Postmasters are instructed to notify the public of the above fee, and to see that all registered matter is fully prepaid, as regards both postage and registration fee.

The attention of Postmasters is specially directed to the regulations (see 1920 Postal Guide,

pages 40 and 65) regarding insufficiently prepaid registered mail matter.

The above fee shall apply to all registered mail matter posted in Canada, on and after

the 15th July, 1920.

Postmasters will please see that immediate notice is given the public through the Press and otherwise.

(13) Provincial Franking Privileges Abolished .- In accordance with an amendment to the Post Office Act passed during the recent session of Parliament, the latter part of Section 141 of the 1920 Postal Guide, which relates to franking privileges accorded members of the Legislatures of the Provinces, also Section 142 and Sections 150, 151, 152 and 153, relating to Provincial franking privileges, have been cancelled.

The Postmaster is, therefore, instructed in future, not to accept at his office free of postage, any of the mail matter mentioned in the cancelled regulations, no matter by whom it is posted

nor to whom it is addressed.

CANADA OFFICIAL POSTAL GUIDE

If any articles of mail matter which are not entitled to free transmission are mailed at his office without postage, the Postmaster will treat them in accordance with the regulations in regard to unpaid mail matter in general.

(14) Lethbridge Inspectorate.—A new Inspectorate has been created known as the Lethbridge Division, with Mr. Fred H. Smith in charge as Inspector. The Inspector will officially take over the work of his Division on July 1st, 1920. The establishment of this new Division has necessitated changes in the boundaries of the present Calgary, Edmonton and Vancouver Division, and on and from the 1st July the territory covered by these three Inspectorates and the new Division is as follows:—

LETHBRIDGE DIVISION.

Includes Electoral Districts of Lethbridge, Macleod south of the dividing line between Townships 17 and 18, Bow River south of the dividing line between Townships 17 and 18, Medicine Hat south of the dividing line between Townships 17 and 18, East and West Kootenay south of the 50th parallel of latitude.

CALGARY DIVISION.

East Calgary, West Calgary, Red Deer, East Kootenay north of the 50th parallel of latitude, Macleod north of the dividing line between Townships 17 and 18, Bow River north of the dividing line between Townships 17 and 18, Medicine Hat north of the dividing line between Townships 17 and 18, certain Post Offices in the Battle River Electoral District as detailed on page 293 of the Canada Official Postal Guide, 1920.

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS

(1) A. R. Forms must be clearly Date-stamped and Postage Stamps affixed properly cancelled.—It has come under the observation of the Department that the date-stamp of the issuing office on A. R. forms is frequently so illegible as to preclude the possibility of their return to the office of origin.

Postmasters are, therefore, enjoined to exercise particular care in stamping these forms when issued so that the name of the issuing office can be easily deciphered and the form returned

without difficulty.

Another irregularity often observed on A. R. forms is non-cancellation of the postage stamps. Apparently some Postmasters are under the impression that the regulations governing the cancellation of postage stamps do not apply to the stamps placed on A. R. forms. Postage stamps affixed to these forms must be cancelled just as effectively as they would be if placed on letters, Money Orders or Postal Notes, and Postmasters are warned against any future neglect in this respect. Proper cancellation is of vital importance to the revenue, and, if necessary, the Department is prepared to take rigorous measures to ensure the careful performance of this duty.

(2) Empty Mail Bags sent to Bag Depositories should bear Slip Labels showing office from which sent in.—The Toronto Bag Depository has been receiving a large number of empty bags which do not bear any slip label or tag to show from what office they have been received. This is very unsatisfactory for those who have to deal with these bags at the Depository and Postmasters are instructed to always attach a label or tag to bags sent to Empty

Bag Depositories which will show the office from which they are being sent in.

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

(1) Addresses of Undeliverable Publications Returned to Publishers not to be Obliterated.—The Department has been informed that frequently underverable copies of publications returned to the publishers have the addresses completely obliterated either by pencil or ink making it impossible to decipher them or to remove them from their mailing lists.

Postmasters are requested to discontinue this practice of scoring out the addresses on undeliverable publications returned to the publishers in such a way as to render them illegible.

(2) Changes to be Noted in 1920 Postal Guide.—Postmasters will please make the following changes in the 1920 Postal Guide recently issued:—

Page 96....Rhodesia.....Letter rate should be 2 cents per ounce instead of 5 cents for the first ounce and three cents each ounce after.

Page 150....Libya......Parcel Post rate for 2 pounds should be 68 cents, and for 4 pounds, 92 cents.

Page 113.....French Edition only
Germany........Parcel Post rate for first pound should be 36 cents instead of 56 cents.

- (3) Brazil—Prohibitions.—Attention is drawn to the fact that the transmission to Brazil either by ordinary or registered letter post, or by parcel post, of articles of gold, silver, precious stones, jewellery and other precious articles is prohibited. See Postal Guide, page 82 and page 113.
- (4) Parcels for United Kingdom—Particulars to be given on Customs Declarations.—With reference to Section 13 on page 6 of the February 1920 Supplement, regarding the necessity for having the Customs Declarations attached to parcels sent from Canada to the United Kingdom carefully filled in, Postmasters are informed that when parcels contain any of the classes of goods mentioned below, the British office requests that the descriptions and individual weights of such goods may be accurately given in the Customs Declaration, or written on the wrapper of the parcel if there is not sufficient room on the declaration form.

The classes of good referred to are:—

Coffee
Cocoa powder
Chocolate
Condensed milk
Milk Powder

Sugar Confectionery and Sweets Crystallised and imitation Fruits and Flowers Fruit, Canned or Dried

Preserved Ginger Jams, Jellies and Marmalades.

- (5) Packing of Butter sent by Parcel Post to United Kingdom.—As a number of improperly packed parcels of butter for the United Kingdom have recently been received. Postmasters are again cautioned to be careful not to accept parcels containing butter unless the butter is packed in a tin box or glass container fitted with a lid either soldered on or screwed on, and the tin or glass container enclosed in a case of corrugated cardboard lined with sufficient cotton or spongy material to absorb the butter in case it melts and leaks out.
- (6) Letter Post to Northern Persia—Transmission of Goods Permitted Exceptionally.—As an exceptional measure, pending the re-opening of the Parcel Post to Northern Persia, goods may be sent to Teheran and other places in the North of Persia by letter post. The rate of postage is the ordinary International rate of 5 cents for the first ounce and 3 cents for each ounce after. Packages must not exceed 2 feet in length or 1 foot in width or depth.
- (7) Mail Service to Hungary.—The following information should be substituted for that published in the April Supplement in regard to the mail service to Hungary:—Letter Mails.....Admitted. Letters may again be sent in closed covers. The importation of unstamped Austro-Hungarian bank notes into Hungary is prohibited. Parcel Post......Not admitted.
- (8) Parcel Post Route Re-opened.—The Parcel Post route to Portugal via England, France and Spain has been re-opened, and parcels for Portugal may again be accepted for transmission by that route at the rates given on page 168 of the Postal Guide.
- (9) Parcel Post Routes Closed.—The Parcel Post route to Denmark via England direct, as well as the route via England and Norway, have been temporarily closed.

Parcels for Denmark may, however, be forwarded via England and Germany at the following rates of postage:—

- (1) Registered matter in mails delayed in despatch.—In the case of delayed despatch of mails due to snow blockade or other unavoidable causes, all registered matter should be charged on the last letter bill issued and dodger letter bills should be sent to the Post Office Inspector to cover dates on which mails did not go forward, each bill bearing the date on which such mails were actually due to have been despatched. The registered letter book should also be altered to show the correct date of despatch and the reason for delay.
- (2) Special delivery in Canada is for letters only.—Particular attention is drawn to the fact that the arrangements made for the delivery by special messenger in certain Canadian cities of letters bearing either a Canadian "Special Delivery" stamp or Canadian postage stamps to the value of ten cents, in addition to the ordinary postage, (see Postal Guide for 1919, page 9, section 14), do not apply to any class of mail matter except letters or packets prepaid at the letter rate of postage, which may therefore be regarded as letters.

(3) Treatment of catalogues &c., which cannot be delivered to addressees.—The attention of the Department has again been drawn to a request printed on envelopes containing catalogues mailed by business firms asking Postmasters to hand undeliverable catalogues to persons who would like to have one.

To allow this request to be complied with would lead to great abuses in connection with the delivery of mail matter as the regulations strictly forbid the delivery of an article of mail matter to any person other than the addressee. Postmasters are instructed, therefore, to ignore any request of this character and treat the matter bearing such a request in the regular manner prescribed by the Postal Regulations.

(4) Furs, skins, &c., in the mails.—It is of the greatest importance that the laws in regard to the shipment of furs, skins, etc., should be strictly enforced, and Postmasters are accordingly instructed to see that the following regulations in Section 200 on page 46 of the Postal Guide for 1920 are fully understood and carefully observed in their offices:—

"The dead bodies of any wild animals or birds or parts thereof, including furs, skins, plumage, eggs, etc., will not be accepted for transmission by mail, even when lawfully killed, unless the packages are plainly marked to show the actual nature of the contents and the name and address of the sender.

During the close season, which varies in the different provinces, no packages containing the dead bodies of any wild animals or birds or parts thereof, including furs, skins, plumage, eggs, etc., may be accepted for mailing, unless the sender produces a permit from the game warden, covering the shipment, and all such packages must bear a full and accurate description of the contents, and the name and address of the sender."

(5) Post Offices having catch Post Service only.—The offices of Cliffside and Deroche, B.C., Premont, P.Q., and Dunrobin and Harwood Plains, Ont., should be added to the list of Post Offices having Catch Post service only.

The offices of Beechwood, Ortonville and Siegas, N.B., and Spanish, Ontario, should be removed from the list.

(6) Parcels sent by Parcel Post to United Kingdom, or via United Kingdom to other countries, must not be registered.—The attention of Postmasters is again drawn to the Regulation in Section 119, page 74, of the Postal Guide for 1919, stating that PARCELS sent by Parcel Post to the United Kingdom, or via the United Kingdom to other countries, must not be registered.

Packages prepaid at letter rate may, however, be accepted to go forward at the sender's risk, and these packages if **fully prepaid at letter rate may be registered.**—Postmasters will be held responsible for any deficiency in the prepayment of registered packages at letter rate.

NO CUSTOMS DECLARATIONS should be attached to packages intended for transmission by LETTER POST.

- (7) United States Special Delivery Stamps on Letters Posted in Canada.—When a letter posted in Canada addressed to the United States bears, in addition to the necessary Canadian postage stamps, a United States Special Delivery Stamp or United States postage stamps of equal value, which the sender has affixed in order to secure special delivery of the letter at the United States office of destination, the Canadian office should be very careful when cancelling the Canadian postage not to cancel or deface in any manner the United States Special Delivery stamp or postage stamps.
- (8) Parcel Post to New Zealand—Increased Limit of Size.—The limit of size for parcels that may be exchanged by Parcel Post between Canada and New Zealand is now the same as for Canadian domestic Parcel Post, that is, the general limit of size is thirty inches in length by one foot in width or depth, but parcels will be accepted up to 3 ft. 6 in. in length provided the combined length and girth do not exceed six feet. For example: A parcel measuring 3 ft. 6 in. in its longest dimensions may measure as much as 2 ft. 6 in. in girth (i.e., round its thickest part); or a short parcel may be thicker; thus if the length is not more than 3 ft. the girth of the parcel may be 3 ft.
- (9) Suspension of International Reply Coupon Arrangements in Italy.—The Postal Administration of Italy has given notice that the sale and payment of International Reply Coupons in that country has been suspended since February, owing to fluctuations in exchange.
- (10) Resumption on Parcel Post to Italy and Greece via Italy.—The Postmaster is informed that Parcel Post has now been resumed to Italy, also that the Parcel Post route to Greece via Italy is again open.

This information supersedes that published in the February and March Supplements to the 1920 Postal Guide.

(11) Mail Service to Russia.—The following information should be substituted for that previously given in regard to the mail service to Russia:

Letter Mails.—Admitted (without registration) to Transcaucasia, Crimea, Novoros-

sisk, Ekaterinodar and Apsheronskaya (Kuban Province).

Admitted to Eastern Siberia. Such mails are to be forwarded on Vancouver.

No postal service to Soviet Russia.

Parcel Post.—Not admitted.

(12) Parcel Post Routes Altered.—The first parcel post route to East Africa mentioned on page 126 of the 1920 Postal Guide should be changed to "(a) Via England direct or via England and India.'

In front of the second route via England and Harrison Rennie Line and Union Castle Line the sign "(b)" should be inserted.

(13) Parcel Post Routes Closed.—The parcel post route to Denmark via England and Norway has been closed for the present. Parcels for Denmark may, however, still be forwarded

via England direct at the rates given on page 124 of the 1920 Postal Guide.

The parcel post route to Portugal via England, France and Spain has been temporarily closed. Parcels for Portugal may, however, still be forwarded via England direct at the rates

given on page 168 of the Postal Guide.

The parcel post route to Egypt via England and France, as well as the route via England, France and Italy, has been suspended. Parcels may, however, still be sent via P. & O. Line direct from England at the rates given on page 127 of the Postal Guide.

(14) Amendments to Foreign Parcel Post Conditions.—The following amendments to the information given in the 1920 Postal Guide concerning the conditions under which parcels may

be sent to the countries named below are to be noted:

Egypt.—page 131, last column, "Special prohibitions" delete the words 'Sugar, except

under permit.

France.—page 131, first column, "Country or colony" to the first paragraph add: 'As far as possible the forms should be made out in the French language, and should show weights or measures in the French (decimal-metric) system.

Add a new paragraph: "Parcels are accepted to Alsace and Lorraine at the rates of

postage and under the general conditions applicable to parcels for France.

Guatemala.—page 136, first column, "Country or colony" add a paragraph: "An invoice relative to the contents of every parcel must be sent by the sender to the addressee

separately from the parcel.

Palestine.—page 16), last column, "Special prohibitions" substitute the following for the present entry:—"Letters; arms and ammunition; saltpetre; salt; drawings; engravings and all printed matter of an immoral or seditious character; hashish; German aniline dyes; living plants, silk worms and bees, unless authorized by the Department of Agriculture; cocaine, sulphonal, anti-tuberculosis serum, picrates, potassium chlorate and sodium chlorate, except under special license issued by the Public Health Department or in the form of medicinal pastilles or specialities approved by the above-mentioned Department.

In the first column "Country or Colony" insert a paragraph:—Parcels must be packed

in strong wood, tin, canvas, linen or similar material and not merely in paper or cardboard.

(15) Mail Service to Hungary.—The following information should be substituted for that previously published in regard to the mail service to Hungary:

Letter Mails.—Letters admitted (without registration). Letters must be enclosed in open covers and any received in Hungary in closed covers will be subjected to Customs examination or returned.

Post cards, Printed Matter, Commercial Papers and Samples admitted.

Parcel Post.—Not admitted.

(16) Parcel Post Rates to Dutch West Indies.—The rates under which parcels may be sent to the Dutch West Indies will until further notice be as follows:-

- (17) Address of Parcels to be on Parcels Themselves.—The attention of Postmasters is particularly invited to Section 114, page 26, of the 1920 Postal Guide in which the importance of the address of parcels being plainly written on the parcels themselves, and not merely on tied-on labels, is emphasized.
- (18) Local Daylight Saving.—It is necessary in all cases that arrangements shall be made to despatch and receive mails in accordance with the Railway Time Tables; but in the matter of time of the opening and closing the post office the postmaster should be guided by the action of the Municipal Authorities-that is, in any place where the local authorities decide to adopt daylight saving time, the post office may do likewise.

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

(1) Prohibited Publications.—The attention of Postmasters is drawn to Departmental circular of the 3rd January, No. H-85, quoting amendments to the Criminal Code, sections 97-A and 97-B, under which any person who circulates, sells, or offers for sale or distribution, or who circulates or attempts to distribute by mailing or causing to be mailed or posted, or who imports into Canada or attemps to import by or through any means whatsoever, any copies of publications which are issued by unlawful societies, etc., or which are of a seditious character, is guilty of an offence and liable to imprisonment for not more than twenty years.

According to a ruling from the Justice Department matter is deemed to be of a seditious character if it discloses an intention

- (1) to bring into hatred or contempt or to excite disaffection against the person of His Majesty, his heirs and successors, or the Government and Constitution of the United Kingdom, as by law established, or either House of Parliament or the administration of justice; or
- (2) to excite His Majesty's subjects to attempt otherwise than by lawful means the alteration of any matter in church or state by law established; or
 - (3) to incite any person to commit a crime in disturbance of the peace; or
 - (4) to raise discontent or disaffection amongst His Majesty's subjects; or
 - (5) to promote feelings of ill-will and hostility between different classes of such subjects.

In the event of any Postmaster observing publications passing through the mail which, in his opinion, contravene the sections of the Criminal Code referred to, he is instructed to send specimen copies of such publications by first mail, under cover, to the Postmaster General (for Secretary), together with such particulars as he is able to furnish regarding their origin, quantity, and destination.

Postmasters should substitute this table for the table given under Section 2, page 220 of the 1919 Postal Guide and under the corresponding section in the Guide for 1920.

The value of Postage Stamps affixed to British Postal Orders must not be paid. British Postal Orders which have been outstanding more than six months from the last day of the month of issue, or which do not bear the original printed numbers, check letters, and serial numbers, will not be accepted. The holders of such orders should return them to the remitters for repayment.

- (3) Parcel Post with Germany. Gifts of Foodstuffs not subject to restrictions or prohibitions.—With reference to paragraph 7 on page 5 of the November, 1919. Monthly Supplement, regarding restrictions and prohibitions applying to the importation of foodstuffs into Germany by sample and Parcel Post, Postmasters are informed that the Department is now advised by the German Post Office that parcels of foodstuffs sent as gifts from other countries solely for the personal use of the addressee and his family are not subject to these restrictions and prohibitions. The addressee must be able to satisfy the German Customs Authorities that the contents of the parcels are gifts and are for his own use.
- (4) Importation and Exportation of Opium, etc., without License prohibited.—Postmasters are informed that under a recent amendment to the Opium and Drug Act, it is forbidden to import into or export from Canada any opium or its preparations, or any opium alkaloids or their salts or preparations, or any coca leaves, cocaine, or any of their salts or preparations, without first obtaining a license therefor from the Minister presiding over the Department of Health.

(5) Franking Privilege to Soldier Settlement Board of Canada.—The privilege of free transmission by post is extended to correspondence on public business addressed to, or sent by

the Soldier Settlement Board of Canada, Ottawa.

(6) Re-direction of Correspondence.—The attention of Postmasters is drawn to Section 233, on page 51 of the Postal Guide for 1919, which requires that written notices from persons who have changed their address and desire to have their correspondence re-directed should be carefully filed, so that they may not be overlooked.

The regulation, as will be observed, sets no limit to the time during which correspondence will be re-directed in accordance with these written notices, although the public is desired to take steps to relieve the Post Office of the trouble of re-direction as soon as may be practicable.

- (7) Post Offices having Catch Post Service only.—The offices of Perkinsfield and Craigleigh, Ontario, are to be removed from the list of Post Offices having Catch Post service only.
- (8) Postmarking of Registered Letters.—In the printed instructions affixed inside of the cover of the book in which registered letters mailed are recorded, it is stated that special care, must be taken in postmarking a registered article, and that a distinct impression of the office dating-stamp is to be placed once on the front and twice on the back of the article over the flap of the cover.

Postmasters are particularly requested to see that this instruction is faithfully carried out

in their offices.



(9) Free Transmission of certain Correspondence concerning Victory Loans, etc.—The attention of Postmasters is drawn to the fact that correspondence relating to War or Victory Loans, addressed to or sent by the Finance Department at Ottawa, is free of Canada postage under Section 134, on page 35 of the Postal Guide for 1919, and also that Section 143, on page 36, provides for the free transmission of War or Victory Loan coupons which branches of banks doing business with Dominion Government Departments send to their head offices, or to their Ottawa branches, without correspondence, in special envelopes properly marked.

The privileges referred to in these regulations are in no way affected by departmental circular No. H-84 of the 27th December, 1919, which, as will be observed, withdraws franking privileges that were temporarily granted under the War Measures Act to mail matter respecting War Loans sent by or addressed to Dominion, Provincial or other Victory Loan headquarters, and mail matter sent by or addressed to Assistant Receivers General in connection with Victory Loan Bonds and National War Savings and Thrift Stamps.

(10) Reports of Aliens to Postmasters.—This Department is advised by the Acting Chief Commissioner of Dominion Police that it is no longer necessary for aliens of former enemy nationalities to report themselves monthly through Postmasters, as has been the practice since October, 1915. The instructions given in Section 3, on page 5 of the October, 1915, Monthly Supplement, to the effect that aliens should report to the local Postmasters, and that the Postmasters should, in turn, report to the nearest Chief of Police, are, therefore, withdrawn.

In connection with this matter the Acting Chief Commissioner of Dominion Police has desired that his thanks should be conveyed to Postmasters throughout Canada for their cooperation and assistance during the period of the war.

(11) Undeliverable Packets returned from United States subject to Postage charges. The following paragraph is to be added to Section 104, on page 72 of the Postal Guide for 1919, and to the corresponding section in the 1920 Guide:—

Undeliverable packets returned to Canada subject to charge.—" Packets of third class matter and packets of merchandise forwarded by post from Canada to the United States and returned as undeliverable are subject to a charge equal to the original postage charge. This charge is to be collected from the sender before delivery by the office to which returned, 'postage due' stamps for the amount collected being affixed to the packet and cancelled by the Postmaster."

- (12) Dutiable Postal Packages must be transferred to Customs.—Report has been made to the Department that in some cases clerks in Post Offices who receive the mails from other countries have taken dutiable packages out to prevent their being transferred to the Customs, and Postmasters are requested to warn their clerks that this is contrary to the law and involves serious penalties, and that any such procedure will be dealt with very seriously by the Department.
- (13) Customs Declarations on Parcels for United Kingdom must fully describe contents.—The British Post Office has again requested that the Customs Declarations attached to parcels sent from Canada to the United Kingdom by Parcel Post should contain full and accurate description of the articles contained in the parcel, and that in the case of dutiable goods being enclosed the weights of such goods should be stated. Postmasters are requested to draw the attention of persons who are posting parcels for the United Kingdom to this matter, and ask them to be particularly careful in filling in the Customs Declarations.
- (14) Parcel Post Route closed.—The route to India via England, France and P & O. Line has, for the present, been closed to Parcel Post. Parcels may, however, still be sent via England and P. & O. Line direct at the rates given in the Postal Guide.
- (15) Parcel Post to Italy suspended.—In consequence of strikes in Italy the Parcel Post service to Italy is temporarily suspended.
- (16) Distribution Dominion Government Income Tax Forms.—It has been requested that Postmasters in Canada will co-operate with officials of the Taxation Branch of the Finance Department of the Dominion Government to the extent of distributing to patrons of their offices income tax forms, supplies of which will be sent to them in the near future by the District Inspector of Taxation, together with all necessary instructions as to distribution of the forms, etc.

This Department will be glad if Postmasters will undertake to distribute the income tax forms as requested.

- (17) Sealed Parcels of Inland Revenue War Tax Stamps transmissible by Parcel Post.—Postmasters are informed that permission has been given for the transmission at Parcel Post rates within Canada of sealed parcels, not exceeding 11 pounds in weight, containing Inland Revenue war tax stamps, provided they are posted by an Officer or Authorized Agent of the Inland Revenue Department and bear on the outside a description of the contents.
- (18) Letter Mails to Bukovina resumed.—The Postmaster is informed that Letter Mails (Letters, Post Cards, Printed matter, Commercial Papers, and Samples), both ordinary and registered, may now be accepted for Bukovina. Parcel Post is not yet admitted.

INFORMATION FOR POSTMASTERS.

(1) Franking Privileges which Lapsed December 31, 1919.—Various Boards Commissions, etc., established to meet conditions arising out of the War were granted franking privileges by Orders in Council passed under the War Measures Act, and Postmasters are informed that owing to the repeal of these Orders in Council the franking privileges in question were cancelled on and from the 1st January, 1920.

Postmusters will note, therefore, that on and from the 1st day of January, 1920, the fellowing mail matter is no longer to be entitled to free transmission, and must be prepaid by postage

stamps in the ordinary way:-

Toronto Sub Office, York-

Mail matter sent by or addressed to Provincial Registrars and Deputy Registrars appointed under the Military Service Act.

b Closed on the inauguration of Rural Free Delivery.

Mail matter respecting War Loans sent by or addressed to Dominion, Provincial or other Victory Loan headquarters.

Mail matter addressed to or sent by the Vice-Chairmen, National War Savings Committees at various points.

Mail Matter addressed to or sent by the Chairman, Trade Commission, Ottawa.

- (2) Franking Privileges Cancelled.—The privilege of free transmission by post which was granted to correspondence addressed to and sent from the Rapatriation and Employment Committee as well as the Canada Food Board at Ottawa and its Provincial offices is cancelled as these bodies are no longer in operation.
- (3) Post Offices having Catch Post Service Only.—The office of Palling, B.C., opened on the 1st December, is to be added to the list of Post Offices having catch post service only.
- (4) Addresses on Letters Returned to Dead Letter Office should not be Scored out.—Dead Letter Office Officials are experiencing difficulty in deciphering the addresses of many undeliverable letters received from post offices owing to the fact that they are scored out with heavy marking pencils where the impress of the "Not Called For" or some such stamp would be sufficient indication of failure in delivery.

Postmasters are requested to discontinue this method of marking undeliverable letters and

enable the Dead Letter Office to dispose of such letters more expeditiously.

(5) Parcel Post to Austria-Parcels can now be accepted for transmission to the following states in Austria:-
